LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES. CHAPTER CLXXXI.

An Act making appropriations for the naval service for the year ending the thirtieth of June, eighteen hundred and sixty-one.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled. That the following sums be, and they are hereby, appropriated for the year ending the thirtieth of June eighteen hundred and sixty-one:
