The Pacific Railroad bill had been made the special order for the 23d in the Senate. A motion to postpone indefinitely its consideration was lost.

Both branches of the Missouri Legislature have passed Convention Bills by large majorities; differing in details; both provide for submitting to the action of a Convention.

The New York Congressional delegation intend calling upon the President, in a body, to urge a strict enforcement.

Senator Davis has forwarded a letter to Gov. Pickens of South Carolina, urging the abandonment of any policy which involves hostilities.

The Virginia House have adopted resolutions for a National Convention at Washington, Feb. 4. Also approving Crittenden's compromise.

The Convention Bill is being debated in the North Carolina Legislature.

North Alabama is said to have telegraphed to her Representatives in Congress, not to withdraw, as delegates from Northern Alabama refused to sign the secession ordinance.

The South Carolina Legislature, now in session, is trying to put the State on a war footing.

Resolutions passed declaring that the attempt to reinforce Anderson be regarded as an act of war.
