It no longer remains much of a riddle whether there is to be a Southern Confederacy or not. The conclusion is almost inevitable that the Montgomery Convention will result in the institution of such a Confederacy. Already six States—South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana—have positively seceded from the Union.

A rambling debate upon the views of Lincoln and the operation of State laws upon slavery followed, and without coming to a vote the Senate adjourned.

In the Senate, Jan'y 23d, Mr. Crittenden moved to take up the Crittenden Resolution. Lost 24 against 27.

The Pacific Railroad Bill was taken up, and the amendments adopted for a branch to Portland, Oregon.

Mr. Seward wishes in the spirit of true and lofty patriotism, to preserve the Union. No fair-minded man will read his speech and entertain a doubt of his sincerity.
