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Indian Depredations on Pitt River. We learn from Mr. W. W. Coryell, who received his information from Mr. Peacock, of Shasta Valley, that about two weeks ago, a party of nineteen men from Rogue river valley with 850 head of beef cattle, on their way to Washoe, via Pitt river, were attacked, while going down the latter named river when a short distance above Fort Crooks, by 125 P'te Indians who killed two of the men, Mr. Evans and Joseph Bailey, and wounded two others, and took possession of all the stock. The men who escaped went to the Fort and returned with the soldiers stationed there. Lieut. Pfluger recovered 170 head of the cattle. His party only saw seven Indians, of whom they killed two and wounded two. Lieut. Pfluger was shot twice, once in the arm and once in the breast. The trail on which this attack was made, is one leading through Pitt river country from Rogue river. One of the murdered men, Mr. Bailey, fought bravely and kept shooting with his revolver until his strength failed and he retired both hands to hold up his pistol. He was last seen by the retreating party, leaning against a rock holding on to his revolver. When the soldiers returned to the spot they found his body pierced through and through with arrows. The body of Mr. Evans was lying near that of Mr. Bailey. Both had been dead some time. We understand that the settlers of Pitt river valley have determined to commence a war of extermination on these Indians without regard to tribe or locality. It is the only sure way of protecting their laws and property, and we suppose it is the speediest and most effective way of establishing a treaty that will be held inviolate. Dead Indians are harmless, and they are the only kind that we have ever seen who would do us a wrong. Kill them is the only way to civilize the thieving marauder savages. Other plans have been tried over and over again, but thus far without the shadow of success.—Yreka Journal.
