THE FOLLOWING IS THE OFFICIAL REPORT OF THE HATTERAS ISLAND AFFAIR, to the Secretary of the Navy: I have to inform you that we have been eminently successful, all has been accomplished.

Articles of capitulation agreed to between Commander Stringham, and Gen. Butler, and the Confederate States Navy and Maj. Andrews, commanding land forces at Fort Hatteras, stipulates that the forces under said Butler, Martin and Andrews, all munitions, men and property, be unconditionally surrendered to the Government of the U. S.

THE EXPEDITION TO HATTERAS ISLAND, resulted in a signal victory over the rebels. The United States forces captured two Forts, twenty-five cannon, one thousand stand of arms and 715 prisoners, among them, Capt. Samuel Brown, Lieut. Sharpe, and Dr. Brown, late U. S. Army.

THE REMAINS OF GEN. LYON ARRIVED AT NEW YORK at 10 o'clock P. M., Aug. 24th, and were escorted to the City Hall by a guard of honor.

THE OFFICERS AND CREW OF THE STEAMSHIP B. B. FISH, which arrived at New York Sept. 18th, were arrested by order of the Navy Department, and placed in double irons.
