

QUARTZ MINING.—Mr. Jewett and Mr. Schiefelin, two of the gentlemen interested in the quartz lode lately discovered in the vicinity of Vanoy's Ferry, called at our office and gave us a few items respecting it. The company have had ten tons of quartz crushed at the Evansville mill, which paid \$32 dollars per ton. The lode is four feet wide, and the quartz appears to be inexhaustible.

The Quartz Mill at the forks of Jackson Creek is now in good shape and will soon commence crushing custom rock again. Having recently made some changes in their amalgamating apparatus they will be able to save all the gold.

Holman & Co. are daily taking out rich rock in quantities that will insure them ample compensation for the immense amount of labor they have expended in opening their claims. The energy and perseverance they have displayed, frequently under unfavorable circumstances, merits the success with which they have met.

Ganung, Haver & Co., owning extension claims on the same lode, have tunneled the hill some 200 feet, intersecting the lode upon the opposite side of the gulch, at least 100 feet below the surface, obtaining good prospects.

The company working upon the other slope of the hill are getting along finely. Their tunnel is the best piece of workmanship of its kind in the vicinity. They appear to be content to let the lode run in Pennsylvania, which signifies his determination to strike either "oil, hell or China." That kind of grit will win sure.

Johnson & Elder are opening the southerly end of their blue lode, and intend to take out a large amount of quartz.

Holmes & Co., adjoining the Johnson claim on the right hand fork, are working away industriously. They ponded out \$100 this week, the proceeds of a little pocket.

Circuit Court.—This Court commenced its Fall term on last Monday morning. Hon. P. P. Prim presiding. The subject is an abstract of the proceedings:

On motion of H. L. Preston, Esq., Theo. S. Pomeroy was admitted an Attorney of this Court.

The following named gentlemen were sworn to serve as grand jurors, viz: 1861 Emory, foreman, Thomas S. Ingraham, S. H. Todd, Sam'l Davis, Rice Benson, W. A. Johnson, Peter Britt.

In the case of Reuben Short for poisoning a horse; continued; James Ludlow, indicted for an assault with intent to commit murder; continued.

On Wednesday morning the Grand Jury returned a bill against F. T. Bright, for grand larceny, and ignored a bill against C. C. Sherwood, for obtaining money under false pretenses. Bright was arraigned and given till Thursday to plead. We omit the sixth session, of which there were twenty disposed of.

A TRAIL.—We mentioned a few weeks since, having received some pears from Mr. Wesley, of Table Rock precinct. From their appearance at that time, we supposed it would require at least two months time to ripen them, and accordingly laid them away in a covered box to mature. But on examining them a few days since, we found them of a rich golden color, and otherwise indicating they were as delicious as the test of eating proved them to be. They tickled our palates more pleasantly than any fruit we have eaten this season. In mentioning these facts to Mr. Philip Ritz, of Corvallis, an experienced nurseryman, he said he supposed it was not generally known that pears taken from the tree before quite ripe, and allowing them to mature in the dark, prevents their being stringy and greatly adds to their flavor.

AN URSAR.—On Tuesday evening last, as the California stage came within sight of town, the horses became frightened at a drove of logs, broke from the road, down the hillside, and brought the wheel of the stage against a stump, overturning it and throwing the wheel horses. The leaders tore themselves away and came in at full speed, scattering a crowd who rushed forth to catch them, but were finally secured. There were five passengers in the stage at the time, but none received other injuries than slight bruises and cuts. The driver, Mr. Bell, was lamed and bruised, but not sufficient to prevent him from making his return trip the next day. No blame is attached to Mr. Bell, as it was an accident that might happen with the most careful of drivers.

TALL WALKING.—Traylor Tatom, in company with two others, Sept. 29th, on a wagon, walked from Scott's Bar, California, across the mountains to this place, by Wolaver's Cut-off, in thirteen and one-half hours—distance estimated to be from sixty to sixty-five miles—killing a black bear on their way. They were found for Nez Perce, in a hurry.

FOR WASHING.—Quite a number of our citizens have left for Washoe this week, with horses and other stock, for which they expect to find a market. Mr. Charles Williams, who returned from that region a few days ago, says that money is plenty and times good, which is found for Nez Perce, in a hurry.

RECOVERING.—Col. John E. Ross, who was run over by his wagon, while descending the mountain near Walden, on the Crescent road, is fast recovering from his injuries, and will be brought home in a few days. The accident occurred on the 3d instant.
