From the census returns of 1850 [we have not seen those of 1860] it appeared that the average weight of fleece of all the fleeks in Vermont was 20 per cent greater than that of Massachusetts, which ranked next her in this respect, and 52 per cent greater than the average weight of all the flocks in the United States.
