Col. Hamilton of Texas.

Colonel A. J. Hamilton, member of Congress from Texas, arrived in this city yesterday from New Orleans. He is well known to our citizens as that one of the Texan members of Congress who refused to join the conspirators, who left Washington during the last days of Buchanan's Administration, and whom Wigfall and Toombs vainly tried to browbeat and bully. He is now on his way to Washington to ask help for suffering fellow Union men in Texas, who have endured everything except extermination at the hands of the mob of rebels who now hold the rule there.

Colonel Hamilton has been living for the last year at Austin, the Texan State Capital. That and three or four counties surrounding it are still strongly Union—so much so that the rebels, greatly as they would have liked to hurt him, did not dare. In these and other counties there were until recently organized Union forces, for armed or trained soldiers, but such bands as could have been quickly called together to aid any attempt of the Government in Texas, and stood ready to defend their leader against all harm.

Colonel Hamilton states that life in Texas is now entirely lawless. The civil law has long been dead; martial law, which took its place, is not executed according to any system known to civilized nations. Every petty Provost Marshal is supreme tyrant in his district, and imprisons and robs at his own discretion. What his carelessness or good nature omits in the way of tyranny, self-constituted Vigilance Committees make up. Thus all who are suspected of loyalty are at the mercy of an irresponsible set of robbers and tyrants.

Until recently there was no regular garrison of rebel soldiers at Austin. As long as they were not there, the Union men were able to protect themselves. But when the soldiers came, the Union men, long ago entirely disarmed, were at their mercy. A friend informed Colonel Hamilton that the soldiers had orders to capture him, and he saw that he must get out of the way. He left on the 24 of July. Before then his house was surrounded by troops, and when he got into the mountains he found all the passes guarded; also all the water holes on the roads leading out of the country. He was for a month in the mountains, and at last, with a few friends, made his way to the Rio Grande, which he crossed into Mexico.

The crossing was opposed by a rebel captain, whom the Colonel made prisoner until he and his party got safely across. But the passage down the Mexican side of the river was made through a succession of ambushes laid by rebel troops for him.

By vigilance they all escaped, however, and at last, after various adventures, reached Matamoros. In Brownsville, opposite Matamoros, the rebels kept a vigilant eye upon the Colonel's movements. He engaged passage in a vessel, but was warned when about to step into the stage that the enemy knew it and had planned to intercept him. Seventy-five men, in fact, waylaid the stage and stopped it three times on the way to the vessel. He then waited for another opportunity, and at last got off by traveling some distance overland, and being set on board a schooner by a friend's shore boat. The rebels, however, saw the movement, and sent a launch with an armed crew to the schooner; a breeze striking up, the Colonel had sail put on the schooner, and set off for New Orleans, leaving the Captain and his ship's papers waylaid on shore. On the way to New Orleans the schooner fell in with the United States ship Bahio, which sent them in safety.

The Colonel looks to be in good health, but has evidently suffered greatly in mind in the last year. He has some touching stories to tell of the trials and sufferings of loyal men in Texas. They have clung nobly to the old flag, but there is fear that, unless soon helped with troops, they will all have to give up. Most of them have already been forced to take the oath, much as they hate it, and many have been forced to join the rebel army. When called upon to take the oath they use many means of avoiding it. One ingenious fellow stopped his car with cotton, so that he might not hear what he was required to say yes to.

As for Colonel Hamilton, he has kept the vow he made at the beginning, never by any act to recognize the rebel authority. He has refused constantly to take the oath, and his prominent position made it until lately imprudent for the rebels to use force. He refused to render an account of property in his possession owing to Northern men, and paid no attention to the summons sent out against him. He procured himself to be elected, over a Secessionist, to the State Senate, and refused to take his seat in that rebellious body, saying he only wanted to show them what the people thought in his district. When summoned to pay the Confederate war tax, he refused, saying that he meant to be on the record squarely as having opposed the rebel movement from first to last.

Colonel Hamilton will on next Wednesday evening give our citizens an account of the present condition of Texas; and his story will be of the most interesting. He is a patriot who has been true to his faith under the most difficult circumstances, and he well deserves at the hands of the citizens of the Empire City such a rousing welcome as they know how to give to such men.
