## Thanksgiving Proclamation—State of Oregon.

Never since the birth of our Nation was there a time when we should feel more inclined to acknowledge Him who does all things well.

Ingratitude is sin. No nation in the world has ever advanced with such gigantic strides. Where much is given much is required. Have we walked in the light as we have received it? Has the moral power in the nation kept pace with the physical? Nay verily—a forgetting of God, corruption in high places, oppression, pride, avarice and intemperance have taken too deep hold upon the hearts of the American people. The judgment which all history and the Bible teach us have been visited upon other nations that have forgotten God, are being visited upon ours.

"Hear, O Earth! Behold I will bring evil upon this people, even their thoughts, because they have not hearkened unto my words, nor to my laws, but rejected it." "I will scatter them as the stubble that passeth away by the wind of the wilderness."

"But this people have a revolting and rebellious heart; they are revoltors and gone."

"They are all grievous revoltors, walking with slanders; they are brass and iron; they are all corruptors."

"Therefore, thus saith the Lord; Behold, I will lay stumbling blocks before this people, and the fathers and the sons together shall fall upon them; the neighbor and his friend shall perish."

"They shall lay hold on bow and spear; their voice roareth like the sea; and they ride upon horses set in array as men of war."

"Thus saith the Lord; Behold, a people cometh from the North country, and a great nation shall be raised from the sides of the earth."

War, all devastating war, is crimsoning our Eastern fields—destroying our national substance, and overwhelming all with gloom; yet peace, dear, sweet, abiding peace is here. Amid many evils, the laws of nature—another name for the will of God—are steadfast, honest and true. The day follows the night; rains and sunshine invigorate the earth; seed time and abundant harvest is vouchsafed to all.

Golden treasures from the mountains are filling the hands of persevering miners in a manner unprecedented in the history of the world. No national taxes have been required at our hands before, and no people has ever been more able, and I trust, willing to pay them. A large accession has been made to our population. Among the number are many who have seen the sad realities of this wicked rebellion, and have come to receive what they may here enjoy—peace and prosperity among a Union-loving people, in a State free from debt.

The blessings of the Great Father are still unnumbered, and his mercies ever tender. Notwithstanding our great national chastisements, trials and afflictions, the best and wisest Government the world ever saw, a Government rocked, but not overthrown, shall stand to bless unnumbered millions of the future.

"Enter into His gates with thanksgiving, and into His courts with praise; be thankful unto Him and bless His name."

Therefore, I, Addison Gibbs, Governor of the State of Oregon, do appoint Thursday, the 27th day of November, as a day of Thanksgiving and Prayer and Praise to Almighty God; and I respectfully recommend to the good people of the State, that they abstain on that day from their ordinary occupations, and gather in appropriate places of worship; that they unite in expressions of gratitude to God, and in invoking His aid in restoring righteousness, peace and concord to our distracted country.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my [L. S.] hand and caused the Great Seal of the State to be affixed, at Salem, this 30th day of October, A. D. 1862.

## AN ACT to Provide the Times for Holding Circuit and County Courts.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon: That the terms of the Circuit Courts of the several Judicial Districts of this State shall be held annually, as follows:

In the First Judicial District, in the county of Josephine, on the second Monday in April and the fourth Monday in October; in the county of Jackson, on the second Mondays in February, June and November; in the county of Douglas, on the second Mondays in May and October.

In the Second Judicial District, in the county of Curry, on the first Monday in June; in the county of Coos, on the fourth Monday in May; in the county of Umpqua, on the third Monday in June; in the county of Lane, on the third Monday in April and on the fourth Monday in October; in the county of Benton, on the second Mondays in April and November.

In the Third Judicial District, in the county of Linn, on the fourth Mondays in March and October; in the county of Marion, on the second Mondays in March and October; in the county of Polk, on the fourth Monday in April and third Monday in November; in the county of Yamhill, on the second Mondays in April and November.

In the Fourth Judicial District, in the county of Clackamas, on the third Mondays in March and October; in the county of Multnomah, on the second Mondays in February, June and November; in the county of Columbia, on the third Tuesday in April; in the county of Clatsop, on the fourth Tuesday in April and the fourth Tuesday in September; in the county of Washington, on the third Monday of May and second Monday in October.

In the Fifth Judicial District, in the county of Wasco, on the second Tuesday in May and December; in the county of Umatilla, on the first Monday in June and the second Monday in November; in the county of Baker, on the third Monday in June and the fourth Monday in October.

SEC. 2. That terms of the County Courts of the several counties shall be held as follows: In the county of Josephine, on the first Mondays in January, April, July and September; in the county of Jackson, on the first Mondays in each month; in the county of Douglas, on the first Mondays in each month; in the county of Umpqua, on the first Mondays in January, April, July and September; in the county of Lane, on the first Mondays in each month; in the county of Benton, on the first Mondays in each month; in the county of Linn, on the first Mondays in each month; in the county of Marion, on the first Mondays in each month; in the county of Polk, on the first Mondays in each month; in the county of Yamhill, on the first Mondays in each month; in the county of Washington, on the first Mondays in each month; in the county of Clackamas, on the first Mondays in each month; in the county of Multnomah, on the first Mondays in each month; in the county of Columbia, on the first Mondays in January, April, July and September; in the county of Clatsop, on the first Mondays in January, April, July and September; in the county of Tillamook, on the first Mondays in January, April, July and September; in the county of Wasco, on the first Mondays in each month; in the county of Umatilla, on the first Mondays in January, April, July and September; in the county of Baker, on the first Mondays in each month.

SEC. 3. That the following Acts, now in force, are hereby repealed, to wit: "An Act to fix the times and places of holding the terms of the Supreme and Circuit Courts," approved June 3, 1859. "An Act to fix the times of holding the terms of the Circuit Courts of the First Judicial District," approved October 12, 1860. "An Act to fix the times of holding the terms of the Circuit Court in Umpqua county," approved October 12, 1860. "An Act to amend the Act to fix the times and places of holding the terms of Supreme and Circuit Courts, so far as relates to the Circuit Courts in Wasco county," approved October 19, 1860. "That section 24 of an Act entitled 'An Act to organize the County Courts, and defining the jurisdiction and the duties of the Judges thereof,' approved June 4, 1859, is hereby repealed. That so much of the Act entitled 'An Act to regulate the terms of Circuit and County Courts in Columbia county, and to fix the salaries of County Judges,' approved October 19, 1859, as conflicts with this Act, is hereby repealed.

Approved, October 17, 1862.
