### TOWN AND COUNTY.

**SCHOOL EXHIBITION.**—The exhibition given by the scholars of Mrs. McCully's school, at the Court House, on last evening, was a fine affair. The exercises consisted of singing, compositions, declamations and charades. The singing, conducted under the superintendence of Mr. Dunlap, was spirited, animated and full of harmony. The compositions showed a considerably proficiency in the sciences of grammar and rhetoric, together with some considerable native skill in the art of composition. We hope after this, in similar exhibitions, the young ladies may all have sufficient courage to read their compositions themselves. The salutatory addresses by the little girls were well timed, and spicy. The declamation by Master McCully was animated and patriotic. May the solemn injunctions of the immortal Story be heeded! There was a little too much sameness in the charades; but, saving the occasional low and indistinct utterances of some of the young ladies, were well performed. Without detracting anything from the excellences of the others, we give the palm to "Em." After the conclusion of the school exercises, the Rev. M. A. Williams, having been called out, made some well-timed remarks on the importance of a high order of female education.

The audience was large, and seemed to be highly pleased with the evening's entertainment.

**WILLOW SPRING.**—The following is from "Emigrant." He comes "down to the work" this time. He says: "I have prospected extensively in the gulches and creeks in this vicinity, and I find gold in paying quantities in all of them. There are about two hundred miners in this camp—some at work with rockers and making wages; others preparing and waiting for water. I saw Crooks & Co. wash from four wheelbarrow loads of dirt seven dollars. If they had plenty of water, their claims would pay from ten to sixteen dollars per day to the hand. Very extensive preparations have been made for winter in flumes, ditches, tail races, etc. I think, from all that I can see and learn, that this is one of the finest mining camps in Southern Oregon. The diggings are generally shallow, and the dirt pays from the top down. Let the rains descend, and the sharp ring of over two hundred picks will make music in the gulches and creeks in this vicinity."

**QUARTZ IN JOSEPHINE COUNTY.**—From an obliging correspondent at Althouse, Josephine county, we have received the following:

"The first successful quartz mining company, in Josephine county, commenced operations at their mill, near Mr. O. Ganiard's place, on the 22d inst. The Company have adopted the name of "Enterprise Quartz Mill and Mining Company," and from appearance of their operations in general, they are justly entitled to the name. Their lode, from which they obtain magnificent gold-bearing quartz, is undoubtedly the most extensive of any yet discovered in Jackson or Josephine county. We hope (and there is not the least doubt in our mind, or in the mind of any other person who has visited their ledge) that the Company have a fortune.
