When an enlisted man draws less than his yearly allowance of clothing, he will be entitled to the difference in money. The men will be enlisted as privates. After being mustered into the service of the United States, the appointment of non-commissioned officers will be made.

Enrolling Office at Jacksonville.

Enrolled men will be sent by Camp Baker, in small parties, at Government expense, to be drilled and mustered into the service of the United States, when arms and clothing will be furnished them.
