INSURBECTION AS A WEAPON OF WAR .-The London Army and Navy Gazette. ted by William H. Enssell (of Bull Rose famel, remarks :

There is a journal in this metropolis which is the reputed organ of the Confederate States. At all events, the paper has decided Southern proclivities. In the last number it is asserted that civilized nations avill think death by powder and ball " is too respectable for men guilty of an attempt to incite an inferior race to insurrection." The allusion arises from a report that Federal officers of a certain negro regiment, which are said to have been taken in Fig., had been sentenced to be shot. This sage is one of many proofs that the Americans cannot comprehend the feelings of this country-it may be of any other-regarding the war. The uprising of a portion of an enemy's subjects, inferior or superior to race, is a desirable object to effect—it is quite a legitimate operation of war. If Great Britain were engaged in a war with France, nothing would be more natural than for our enemy to excite Hindoo, Mas-No rule of sulman, or Arab to revolt. warfare would permit as to treat officees engaged in the service otherwise than as men conducting a legitimate operation. It is a necessary evil of a war, in which service insurrection may be invoked by an invader. to increase the ordinary horrors and calamities of hostile occupation. When som years ago Southern statesmen, insolent and aggressive, threatened this country with war, it was remarked over and over again in British journals, that the disputch of some of our West Indian regiments to Leuisium or the Carolinas might be one of the most formidable agencies to which even as a vast beligerent power could resort. Our southern friends must carry the whole weight of slavery on their shoulders, in neuco or in war. Servile insurrection would be a dreadful cvil. It would be a repetition of the Indian revolt of 1857 An inferior race would rise against their mosters. But it is an accident and a contigent of any war, in which a State of slave-holders engages. The officers who develop it are as free from any act of vengeance or retaliation as those who fight on the decks their ships or in the lines of their regiments.

#### U. S. Income Tax.

THE LAW CONTEMPLATES THAT The LAN Country of the land of the land of the less \$600) derived from any source whatever. A person is allowed to deduct all legally assessed National, State and County Taxes. Hired help, Rents, Drayage, &c., necessary to carry on his buriess; but no farmer, merchant, mechanic, or any person, bas a right to deduct his own labor as so much expense from his income.

The Income Tax is to be paid on the income of the year commencing January 1st, 1862, so that on the evening of December 31st, 1862, everybody should make up a record of their income gains or profits for that year. And as many sources of income, such as Dividends and Railroad Bonds and Stocks, Insurance Stock, Savings Banks, interest, &c., (they having already paid the income tax.) are not again taxed. It therefore becomes necessary to have a clear record of the sources of income, that there may be no dispute with the Assessor. All corporations must deduct three per centum before declaring their dividends.

For Example: man in business must make up the nett

profits of his business for the year, and pay the tax on the amount less \$600. A man may, outside of his business, spend all and even more than his profits in the A man may, outside of his business, spend all and even more than his profits in the business; nevertheless he must pay tax on all nett business profits except the \$600. And so with a salary, all over \$600 must be taxed, though personal or family expenses consume it all.

The Income Tax for the year 1862 is as sessable on the first day of May, 1863, and is due and payable on or before the 30th June, 1863. And any sums due and unpaid

June, 1863. And any sums due and unpaid for thirty days after the 30th June, as aforesaid, and for ten days after demand by the Collector, five per centum will be added to the amount unpaid.

Each individual of any firm or partner-
