Public Enterprise.

To secure a prosperous State, commonwealth or community, private virtue and private enterprise are not alone sufficient. There must be something above and beyond these, and that something is public enterprise and public virtue. It lifts its possessor above the common plane of grovelling selfishness, gives him a broader and wider field of usefulness, and prompts him to make harmony, intelligence and the development of intellect a secondary motive at least, in his ambition. Churches, school houses, seminaries of learning, telegraphs, and many other noble works, are the legitimate development of this spirit. Show us a country where they have no roads, no bridges, no safe public highways for travel and trade and we will show you a country where the inhabitants have withdrawn within the narrow shell of selfishness, and neighbor values neighbor only as he can coin him into gold. Cities are built and towns are made to flourish under the life giving and developing energy of public enterprise. Without it their doom is fixed and their fate is sealed. Let the men of influence and wealth in any section of the country become entirely selfish, and give the cold shoulder to every public enterprise, unless it rings with the music of the "almighty dollar," and grass will grow in the streets of its towns, and reeling dilapidations proclaim the general stagnation of business and ruined prosperity. Its mechanics and artisans will depart, and no new buildings be constructed, until the old, touched by Time's effacing fingers, shall speedily decay. Such is the melancholy history of many towns. Such the sure doom of any community destitute of public enterprise.

Individual selfishness, the precursor of all this ruin, is a sort of knarled infatuation. It preys upon itself. What it apparently gains in gold it loses in the depreciation of property and in the general decrease of business. It may live and thrive upon the very vitals of community for a short time, but its operations are fearfully exhaustive, and the vital current will soon be absorbed in a legal harvest.

INMATE.—One week ago last Tuesday, a man was seen sitting on the banks of a creek a short distance this side of Coles' mountain house. A gentleman passing spoke to him, but he made no answer.
