The Races.

FIRST DAY.—Thursday last, the appointed time for the commencement of the three days' horse racing, under management of the Jackson County Jockey Club, opened with fine weather. On repairing to the track at noon, we found that several hundred persons had congregated to enjoy the sports.

At the appointed hour it was announced from the Judges' stand, that the sports would commence with a race for a purse of \$100 single dash of a mile, free for all—entrance, ten per centum.

The following entries were then made: Archy Chrisman, named gray mare, "Mary Thompson"—five years old, sired by Ganger, dam by Leviathan, colors red and white; J. W. Michel named his bay mare "Katie Dixie"—five years old, sired by the Jenkins Lumax, dam unknown, color purple; J. Reed entered his sorrel gelden, "Reub"—aged —, sired by George, dam by Printer, color, mixed; James S. Ollam entered sorrel filly "Zephyr"—four years old, sired by Sumpter, dam unknown, color, checked; A. B. Stevens entered his sorrel horse, "Buck"—four years old, sired by Lumax, dam unknown, color pink. The riders drew the following positions for their horses: Reub 1st, Buck 2d, Mary Thompson 3d, Kate Dixie 4th, and Zephyr 5th.

The gray mare, "Mary Thompson," appeared to be the popular favorite, and most of the betting was made on her against "Kate Dixie."

The sorrel horse, "Buck," got a fine "bulge" on the others in starting, and led them gallantly about half way round the course, when "Mary Thompson" took and kept the lead to the end of the race.

The race was won by "Mary Thompson"—time, one minute and fifty-three seconds.

The colt race was a failure. No entries being made. Quite a number of three year old colts, representing the best stock in the country, were in training, but the owners, with the exception of the owner of "Minie Rifle," were not willing to enter the same.

To compensate for the failure of the colt race, a purse of ten dollars, with five dollars entrance to be added to the same, was offered by the proprietor of the track to all Spanish and half breed horses, for a single dash of a mile. "Rappahannock," "One-eyed Riley," and a mare, owned by Mr. Duskins, were entered for the purse. This was the most exciting race of the day. "One-eyed Riley" led until the horses swung around the corner, on the home stretch, when "Rappahannock" passed him, and soon after, the Duskin mare shot by and pushed "Rappahannock" closely. The boys plied the whip freely down the home stretch, but despite all the efforts of the little mare, old "Rappahannock" came out winner, amid the deafening shouts of the crowd. This closed the programme of the day. There were some quarter races run, and the usual after performance of scrub racing.

SECOND DAY.—Purse of \$200. Twenty dollars entrance, to be added to the purse. Mile races, heat two in three. The following entries were made: Archy Chrisman entered "Mary Thompson"; J. W. Mitchell entered "Kate Dixie"; Judge Tolman entered "Minie Rifle," a Rifleman filly, three years old. The riders drew the following positions for their horses: "Kate Dixie," inside track; "Mary Thompson," middle, and "Minie Rifle" outside. At the tap of the drum, the horses were off. "Minie Rifle" took the lead at the first turn, and held it steadily all the way round, shooting down the home stretch with grace and power, winning the heat easily—time, one minute and fifty-one seconds. "Kate Dixie" was next, and "Mary Thompson" last. On the second start, owing to some misunderstanding on the part of "Minie Rifle's" trainer, the other horses got from sixty to one hundred yards the start of her. She was hard pressed to save her distance, but succeeded in doing it. "Minie" made the second heat in one fifty-one. The heat was easily won by "Mary Thompson"—time, one fifty-six. The next start was a very good one. "Mary Thompson" took the lead, and held it firmly all the way round. "Minie Rifle" was next, and "Kate Dixie" last. "Minie" did not try to win this heat. Her owner would have withdrawn her, but for the heavy bets on her against "Kate." "Mary Thompson,"

whom nobody thought had any show at the commencement of the race, was still game and full of undeveloped power.

The sympathies of the crowd were with "Minie" all the time. Her competitors were five year olds, and of acknowledged speed and bottom. Had she obtained a fair start in the second heat, they would have been compelled to come home in 1:50 or 1:51 to have beat her. Thursday was "Minie's" birth-day, and she commenced her fourth year with honor to herself.

Second Race.—free for all half-breed horses; purse \$100; single dash of one mile. Entries, "Tex" and "Appalus Flora." This race was well contested all the way round, but "Tex's" acknowledged bottom told towards the last, and he came in victor—time, two minutes and three seconds. The day's sport closed with the usual after performance in the scrub line.

THIRD DAY.—Match race, single dash of a mile, for three year olds. Entries—"Yreka Maid," by J. Richardson; "Charleston," by L. F. Mosher. The first was a bay mare, of "Lumax" stock; the second, a bay mare of "Rifleman" stock. Won by "Charleston," in 1:56.

Match Race.—Mile heats, best three in five, for a purse of \$250, with \$100 entrance to be added. Entries—brown horse "Pluck," by Mr. Bogart, of Yreka; and light bay horse "Nebraska Bill," by Ad. Hellms. The horses came to the scratch, and both got off well on the first heat, "Pluck" having the inside track, which he managed to hold all the way round, coming in one length ahead, and winning the heat in 1:51.

On the second heat the horses again got a fine start, "Pluck" a little ahead. "Nebraska" crowded him very close all the way round, making the race intensely interesting; but on the home stretch, the rider of "Pluck" plied the whip heavily, and brought his horse home one-half length ahead, and winning the heat. Time 1:52.

On the third heat, by some blunder, "Pluck" got about seventy-five yards the start, distanced his rival and won the purse. Time 1:54.

As we go to press match racing is still going on, and will probably continue for several days.
