CIRCULAR.

HEAD-QUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF PACIFIC,
PROVOST MARCHAL'S OFFICE,
San Francisco April 2, 1863.

SOLDIERS—regulars or Volunteers—who
have deserted, or absented themselves from
their companies or regiments without leave:
The opportunity is now afforded you
to wipe out the stain attached to your-
selves, and from your families and friends
the shame and reproach consequent upon
your desertion or unauthorized absence
from your regiments.

The President of the United States, by
his proclamation, dated March 10, 1863,
offers to restore you to the service without
punishment, except forfeiture of pay dur-
ing your absence, provided you report your-
selves on or before the 1st of June next.
It is known that many of you in times past,
were induced to desert the service, with
the vain hope of making your fortunes speedily
in the mines, and have often since desired
to return to duty in the army.

It is believed that since treason and re-
bellion have involved our once happy coun-
try in all the horrors of civil war, and
drenched the land in blood, evil disposed
persons—traitors in the guise of friends—
have enticed you to desert the noble Pro-
phet, your fathers and you, once revered. Rally
again around that flag—assist your coun-
try in maintaining the supremacy of its
Constitution and laws—may, even its national
existence, and show by your zealous de-
votion that the enemies of your country
are your bitterest foes.

Report yourselves in person at once to
the commanding officer of the nearest mil-
itary post, or to any recruiting officer; or
by addressing a letter to the undersigned,
you will be instructed to whom you may re-
port.

one Waggoner, and seventy-eight privates.

being mustered into the service of the United

U. S. Income Tax.

THE LAW CONTEMPLATES THAT

every one shall pay on all net profits

(less \$300) derived from any source what-
ever. A person is allowed to deduct all
legally assessed National, State and County
Taxes, hired help, Rents, Drayage, &c.,
necessary to carry on his business; but no
farmer, merchant, mechanic, or any person,
has a right to deduct his own labor as so
much expense from his income.

The Income Tax is to be paid on the in-
come of the year commencing January 1st,
1862, so that on the evening of December
31st, 1862, everybody should make up a
record of their income gains or profits for
that year. And as many sources of income,
such as Dividends and Railroad Bonds and
Stocks, Insurance Stock, Savings Banks,
Interest, &c., (they having already paid the
income tax,) are not again taxed. It there-
fore becomes necessary to have a clear
record of the sources of income, that there
may be no dispute with the Assessor.

All corporations must deduct three per
centum before declaring their dividends.

For Example:

A man in business must make up the net
profits of his business for the year, and pay
the tax on the amount less \$300.

A man may, outside of his business, spend
all and even more than his profits in the
business; nevertheless he must pay tax on
all net business profits except the \$300.

And so with a salary, all over \$300 must
be taxed, though personal or family ex-
penses consume it all.

The Income Tax for the year 1862 is as-
sessable on the first day of May, 1863, and
is due and payable on or before the 30th
June, 1863. And any sums due and unpaid
for thirty days after the 30th June, as afore-
said, and for ten days after demand by the
Collector, five per cent
