LATEST BY TELEGRAPH.

TELEGRAPH.—The stage of this evening brings overland telegraph news, that telegrams from Vicksburg, give reports from rebel deserters, that the 16th of June was as long as the the garrison could hold out. The copperhead Democracy, of Ohio, have nominated the traitor, C. L. Vallandigham, for Governor. Bragg has sent three divisions to Johnson, to operate against Grant, but Grant neither fears rebels in fort or in the rear.

The rebels in small force attacked Millkens bend, but were repulsed by "smoked yankees," as the "contrabands" are now called. At Port Hudson everything looks favorable to final success. A project is on foot in New York, with concurrence of the President, to raise 100,000 negro soldiers. Gold 42, declined to 40 and closed at 42 1/2. The rebel cavalry at Culpepper are supported now by large bodies of infantry.

Jo. Johnson is reported to have from 20,000 to 30,000 troops at Big Black, endeavoring to cross. Osterhaus is watching him with sufficient force. Rumored that Pemberton requested Grant to permit the women and children to pass through his lines, and that 300 cattle were turned loose outside of enemy's works. In South Carolina, two regiments of negroes, under Montgomery, had defeated the rebels at Potolaligo. A cheering dispatch throughout, but not exciting.

New York, 10th.—The billiard tournament that has been progressing for the last ten days at Irving Hall, closed last night. Dudley Cavenaugh, of New York, was declared the champion of America.

SPANISH MOSS.—Leaving Sparrow's plantation, we swung out into the stream, and then for several miles steamed along the borders of the lake, [Lake Providence, La.] here fringed with cypress trees clothed with wierd and dismal Spanish moss. The effect of this drooping parasite, pendent in long waving folds from the trunk and branches, is depressing in the last degree. It is suggestive of death and weeping willows. It is the embodiment of vegetable woe. No party, however joyous, can approach it, and a mysterious influence not appear to emanate from its gasty folds, which throws a damp upon their spirits, and compells their silence until the unsightly objects is passed. Those who have seen no mosses more pretentious than the green fungi growing on trees and rocks in Northern exposures, can form no adequate idea of the wonderful exuberant growth of the Tisandria. Consumption is not more fatal to the life of man than this parasite to the life of trees. Once let it fix its iron grasp upon its stem and branches, and the proud monarch of the forest becomes a dead and worthless trunk. The gray hair like fiber hangs in folds three feet long hangs in folds from every twig, the stouter end uppermost, resembling for all the world an aggregation of disbeveled locks. The wind sighs and moans through the pendants with that peculiar mournful sound one hears from telegraph wires during a gale of wind.—Chicago Tribune.

Language, history, ideas of right and wrong, crime and virtue, are all confused in that political cauldron from which rises the boddy phantom of modern "Democracy."—Sac. Union.
