To the People of Southern Oregon :- The undersigned having been appointed, by the "California and Oregon Railroad Compuny," Commissioners to open stock books, for subscription to the capital stock of said Company, would most respectfully call the attention of the people to the importance of the enterprise, and the objects now in view. It is not proposed now to receive subscriptions to the capital stock of the Company, but to receive subscriptions to the "Survey Fund." The citizens of Marysville, Cal., have started the survey with a subscription of three thousand dollars, and all the towns on the route between Marysville and the State line are moving in the matter. We now ask the citizens of this part of our State, to come forward and aid this enterprise, with the same public spirit that has been evinced in California. Subscriptions will be received at all central points throughout the Rogue River and Umpqua Valleys. Subscriptions of any amount will be received, and are policited. Subscribers to this fund will be entitled, for every ten dollars subscribed by them, to one vote in the first meeting for the permanent organization of the Company, to be held at Yreka, so soon as the survey is completed to Portland; and if they desire to take stock in the capital of the Company, their subscritions to the survey will be credited to their subscriptions to the capital stock. The subscriptions in Rogne River Valley will be placed in the hands of James T. Glenn, Esq., of Jacksonville, and those in the Umpqua Valley will be placed in the hands of A. R. Flint, Esq., of Roseburg, to be, by them, paid to Mr. Elliot, the Engineer of the Company, as he passes through in making the survey. It is to be hoped, ulso, that all persons through whose lands the surveyors may pass, and all others, will render any and all assistance they can to the party.
