

Copperheadism--What is it.

A few years from the present time—possibly much sooner—many of the men in this State, who are now doing all they can to embarrass and weaken the Government in its efforts to preserve the life of the nation, will wish that their tongues had withered in their heads, before they had raised voice in support of that vile and sneaking Copperheadism of these latter days, which, instead of bearing fruits of peace as they would have us believe, has been productive in some of the Eastern cities of nothing but bloodshed and riot. When the passions and the prejudices which the gigantic struggle in which the nation is now engaged have passed away—when the smoke of battle has been lifted from the scene, and all the surrounding objects appear in their just proportions, no difficulty will be experienced in properly estimating these men.

They talk, in the platform upon which they profess to stand, about *habeas corpus*, constitutional rights, executive usurpations, and the like, for the purpose simply of veiling their true position and sentiments. They are really in favor of the division of the country and the recognition of the independence of the Southern States. There is no use in attempting to cloak their intentions and aims. This is the ground upon which they stand, and this is the light in which they are to be viewed. They have given up all hope of American greatness in the future. The vision of U. S., in the front rank of nations and the theory of self-government, universally triumphant, has no longer any charms for them. For the sake of a paltry office—for the sake of selfish gain—they are willing that the proud fabric which has for so long a time challenged the admiration of the world, should be razed to the ground and not one stone be left on another.

They occupy the position of Saul at the martyrdom of Stephen. They stand by and hold the garments of those who are attempting the assassination of liberty; but, unlike Saul, no opportunity will ever be offered to them for repentance. In religion the persecutor has often been converted into a saint. In politics there is no instance on record of a traitor turning patriot. To creep and crawl amid the ruins of their country—to grub among and underneath these mighty fragments, like slimy worms, is all they ask. For the sake of prospect, not of position, but of the emoluments which position yields, they are willing to inaugurate a peace which would only be the prelude to a chronic war. What concern is it of their's if this great Republic should be split up into a number of petty irascible and warring nationalities? What care they if the history of the South American States should be re-produced among us? What matters it to them if, while in such a state of disorganization, some foreign Potentate should step in and reduce us all to the condition of his vassals? We repent, what is it to them that any of these things might take place, provided, in the mean time, they succeed in obtaining a little office and hoarding up a few dollars for a rainy day.

There is, however, a picture of the future which, in their greed of personal aggrandizement, they have entirely ignored. When the Government has succeeded in crushing this rebellion—which it will, most assuredly and that before long—in what position will they stand? Most of them have heard of the Hartford Convention, and of the infamy, growing more indelible as time advances, which attaches the hands of all those who participate in it. Their condition will be infinitely worse and more generally decried than that of those early traitors, most of them have read of Benedict Arnold, and his treason, and what became of him. If they persist in their present course they will sink to a lower depth than even Arnold; for in the time of the great peril of the country they were not only cold and unmoved, but absolutely in sympathy with those who conspired to overthrow the Government. More than that, in the very hour of triumph—namely, on the 9th day of July last, when the wires were flashing nothing but reports of Federal victories of the most decisive character—they, in effect, counseled the abasement of the Nation at the feet of Jeff. Davis, and the acceptance of any terms which he might be pleased to dictate! We firmly believe, if by any unforeseen calamities the rebels should succeed in accomplishing the stupendous crime which they have essayed, there is no class of persons in the free States whom they would more utterly despise than your obsequious and cringing Copperhead, willing to surrender up everything that men hold dear or sacred for a little crust, no matter how beslavered by the blood-hounds of the rebellion.

LATEST.

SATURDAY EVENING, AUG. 1st.—We have a tedious telegraph dispatch this evening, a good portion of which is devoted to the particulars of a casualty at a Democratic Mass meeting at Marysville. A large crowd had collected on a balcony over the Stage Office. The supports of the balcony gave way suddenly and came crashing to the pavement, upon which was standing a crowd of persons. Several persons were killed and 30 or 40 wounded.

Pegram, with rebel forces variously estimated at from 2,500 to 15,000, attacked Richmond, Ky., on the 29th. Our troops fell back to Lexington pursued by the rebels. Federal troops rapidly concentrated and saved Lexington. At noon the rebels attacked Paris and were driven away towards Winchester.

The Army of the Potomac occupies practically the position it did two months ago. It is now quietly recruiting and recuperating. For the next month the cavalry will do all the fighting. A large number of officers have been detailed to bring in the drafted men.

Rebels Price, Holmes and Marmaduke have gone to the defense of Little Rock, Ark., which is in danger from Gen. Blunt.

Rebel steamer *Merrimac*, built by British contractors, has been destroyed by a Federal gunboat. The Charleston "Mercury," of the 27th, says, in the late attack on Fort Wagner, the Federals held their position in front over two hours, under a galling fire; the firing on the fort was terrific, but the rebels were amply protected by bomb-proofs.

On the 28th, John Morgan and officers captured with him had arrived at Cincinnati.
