WHAT THE ENEMIES SAY OF GILMORE.—The Raleigh (N. C.) Standard, of July 13, thus speaks of Gen. Gilmore, commanding the Union troops at Charleston:

Gen. Quincy A. Gilmore, the successor of Hovey, is in command of the Yankees. He is considered a very dangerous man where fort or other works are to be reduced by artillery. He is a native of Ohio, and in 1844 graduated at West Point at the head of his class. For a year or two after his graduation he was a Professor of that institution.
