WHAT THE REBELS SAY OF GILMORE.—The Raleigh (N. C.) Standard, of July 13, thus speaks of G. N. Gilmore, commanding the Union troops at Charleston:

Gen. Quincy A. Gilmore, the successor of Hancock in command of the Yankees. He is considered a very dangerous man where forts or other works are to be reduced by artillery. He is a native of Ohio, and in 1844 graduated at West Point at the head of his class. For a year or two after his graduation he was a Professor of that institution. Subsequently he was assigned to the duty of experimenting upon the power of projectiles upon the earth, wood and earthworks, and spent several years in this duty, acquiring in that time more experience and knowledge on that subject than any man in this country. The more perfectly to record the results of his experiments he took photographs of the effect of every shot fired. At Fort Palski he for the first time brought his skill to the test of actual experience; Palski was considered next to Sumter in impregnability. Gilmore getting his guns to within six hundred yards knocked it to pieces as he might have done a house of cards. When we say that Gilmore is a man of intellect, and known all about cannon, we have said all that can be said in his favor. His elevations represent him as a fellow of low personal merits, whilst at West Point, was rather more than suspected of cowardice.

We will overlook the charge that Gilmore is suspected of cowardice, and take the rest as gospel truth, even though it comes from a rebel.
