New York, 14th.—A Leavenworth telegram yesterday, says the latest intelligence from the Indian country, gives additional significance of the operations of General Grant. Childs and McIntosh, have come over to our side, bringing with them the entire Creek nation, of which they are leaders and Chiefs. Contrabands on Red river report the Chickasaws had also avowed their allegiance to the Federal Government, and unless Hunt is ordered to return, Texas may be easily reclaimed.

The expedition which left New Orleans on the 5th, under Gen. Franklin, is now believed to be destined for the Rio Grande.

St Louis, 13th.—Quantrell and his band reported in Northern Missouri, divided into small squads, committing depredations.

Bragg is retreating steadily to avoid a repetition of the scenes at Tallahatchie, and to prevent desertions, nevertheless large numbers of deserters come to our lines daily. 300 of the 9th Tenn., came in on Tuesday. At least 1,000 deserters have arrived since the evacuation. Many others are said to be at Missionary Ridge.

New York, 14th.—A Knoxville, Tenn., letter reports a grand ovation to our troops, which flags which have been hidden since the rebellion broke out were exhibited. Valuable machine shops and foundries were seized at Knoxville. Also 2,000,000 pounds of salt, and a large quantity of provisions.

The prisoners captured at Cumberland Gap, were the 2d N. C., 1st Ga., and 1st Va. regiments. Gen. Burnside was to be at Knoxville on the 10th, where he would remain until the decision of the War Department regarding his resignation is made.

During the whole march of his army, a distance of nearly 300 miles, only one casualty occurred, and that from sickness.

A special Washington dispatch to the *World*, says our forces occupy Culpepper, and it is believed there is nothing but rebel pickets on this side of the Rapidan. No movements of the rebels towards any of the lower gaps in the valley of Virginia, so that the rebels could not be inaugurating another invasion.

The rebels report that the flag Major Anderson had with him at Sumter, was won by them in a late assault, is not true.

Louisville, 14th.—A party of guerrillas numbering 300, under Hamilton appeared in the cross roads on the Bucksville and Tompkinsville turnpike a day or two since, where a camp meeting was in session. They passed in among the people, producing great havoc, and scattering the congregation. Women were robbed of their jewels, and men of watches and purses. Many valuable horses were taken. Gen. Harvey commanding at Glasgow immediately sent forward a detachment of cavalry to intercept the thieves.

New York, 14th.—The *Times* special dispatch from Washington says, besides marching of Longstreet's corps which has been already announced, our correspondent of the Army of the Potomac sends word that the corps of Ewell and Hill recently camped between Gordonsville and Culpepper have also fallen back and are now at Gordonsville if not farther off. This is conclusive evidence of the weakening of Lee's army by detachments as re-enforcements for Beauregard and Bragg.

A lady arrived from Richmond says for many days previous to her departure several regiments daily passed through the city.

As the 2d battalion of 63d Indians were passing through Terra Haute on Saturday an attempt was made to hang Hon. Daniel Voorhees who was on the train. He was rescued by the officers, but was compelled to leave the train at Greenastle.

A supply of incendiary shells to be used against Charleston were sent to Gilmore of the Arago.
