New York, Sept., 24th.—The Times special says Meade's cavalry and part of his infantry are on the south side of the Rapidan. The cavalry penetrated to Orange Court House, without meeting any signs of rebels. The rebels have retired from Gordonsville.

Balford with his own, and Kilpatrick's cavalry occupied Madison Court House last night, the village was deserted by nearly all the male inhabitants. Few prisoners were taken.

Fair Mountains which day before yesterday was occupied as a rebel signal station, is now in our possession. Clark Mountain 7 miles to the left of Culpepper is still held by the rebels. Nearly all the male inhabitants of Culpepper have been arrested, and are now held by the Provost Marshal.

The Times special dispatch says orders left Washington on the 14th for Burnside to reinforce R. Averans. He could not possibly reach him before the 17th, as he was then at Jonesboro, where he expected an encounter with Longstreet's reinforcements going to Bragg. He could not, therefore, reach Chattanooga 150 miles distant to meet the attack before the 26th.

A Norfolk, Va., letter in the Tribune, says Lee has been at Charleston within a few days, and probabilities are he will superintend the final struggle at Chattanooga.

Fortress Monroe, 24th.—Richmond Whig today reports three days hard fighting in Georgia with heavy loss on both sides. Confederate loss 5,000. Among the killed are Generals Smith, Woodford, Waltham, Helm, Deshler and Wood.

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 22d.—Fighting still going on. We have every confidence that the enemy will be driven from his present stand at Mission Ridge, six miles from Chattanooga. In the three days fight enemy has been driven 11 miles to position now held by him. The "Whig" editorially speaks of affairs at Chattanooga despondently.

Chattanooga, 23d.—No attack was made by the rebels, though one was confidently expected to-day. Our position has been vastly strengthened by additional works commanding the approaches from the South while our flanks and communications are amply cared for. The only demonstration to-day was by heavy columns of infantry and artillery on our left which crossed the Mission Ridge towards Ringold, without replying to our artillery. It is believed a movement is intended to intercept Barriade.

MEXICO.—News from Mexico to August 19th. Guerrillas on the road near the City of Mexico have captured a number of French trains. They are excessively annoying, and have gained several triumphs over French and Franco-Mexican troops. They drove the French from Jalapa and Orizaba, and at latest dates occupied those places. A force of 3,500 traitor Mexican forces were defeated with great loss near Puebla. The Mexican papers are anxiously awaiting to learn that Maximilian has accepted the crown, when they say the Triumvirate will recognize the South. Saligny, the French Minister had been poisoned, by whom not known. The prisons were filled with persons charged with treason against the Imperial Republic. A great excitement was created by the publication of a report that our Government was about to send an army of 30,000 to assist the Juarez Government.

SEEKING AN AVANTAGE PASS.—Francis Galton, a well-known English traveler and member of the "Alpine Club," has this Summer made a singular experience. He discovered a spot on the Jungfrau range, where he might stand in safety and watch the avalanches sweeping past him, within thirty feet of his person. In one half day he saw three descents. The avalanches slid two thousand feet, then leaped two great bounds of a thousand feet more, to the channel, close to which he was standing, and then burst out at the foot of the channel, "like a storm of shrapnell." Galton describes the general appearance of the avalanche, when seen at so short a distance, as that of "an orderly mob filing the street and hastening, not hurrying to the same object." Something of the same impression is made upon one who looks attentively at the great sheet of water which rolls slowly down on the Canadian side of the Falls at Niagara. The motion is majestically deliberate, and though swift, not hurried.

PENITENT.—Nine negroes who did not vote, contributed as much to the Sanitary Fund at North San Juan, Cal., as the sixty-four Copperheads who voted, whereupon Judge Stidger asks the pertinent question: Who deserves the most sympathy from Union men, the negroes or the Copperheads?
