

GRANT'S ARMY.—It was generally supposed that after the surrender of Vicksburg the large and effective army commanded by General Grant would co-operate with Rosecrans' force in the extinction of the rebels under Bragg. But the capture of the Mississippi stronghold was scattered in various directions. Two divisions of the Ninth Army Corps returned to Kentucky to reinforce Burnside, and took part in the recovery of East Tennessee. The Thirtieth Army Corps, under General Ord, was transferred to the Department of the Gulf, and a portion of it is now with General Franklin. General Sherman's corps remained at Vicksburg and in that vicinity. Two divisions of McPherson's corps were sent to Helena, and, under General Steele's command, are operating in Arkansas. The troops under General Harbut's command, in West Tennessee, and such Brigades as Sherman and McPherson can spare, are all that Grant could immediately send to the assistance of Rosecrans'. But there are forces in Kentucky and north of the Ohio, in General Burnside's department, which may be hurried southward to strengthen the Army of the Cumberland. Our military management has again been at fault in this—that we have undertaken too many different operations at once. Our forces are ample, but they are scattered, and liable to experience disaster from the sudden concentration of the enemy in overwhelming strength. After opening the Mississippi, we returned to our old error of conquering detachments of rebels in different States, instead of concentrating for the destruction of the two armies which embody the military strength of the rebellion. The operations in Arkansas are entirely of a secondary character, and might have been postponed until Bragg had been disposed of. One-third of Grant's army added to the Army of the Cumberland and the forces of Burnside would have created a host sufficiently powerful to have carried the old flag into the heart of Georgia. It seems to require an occasional, unexpected blow from the enemy to recall us from the policy of diffusion and occupation into which we are inclined to lapse after a succession of victories.—See Union.

SENATOR HARDING.—The Marysville (Cal.) Appeal, after giving the substance of Senator Harding's letter to Dr. Henry, says: "It is evident from all this that some injustice has been done to Senator Harding; but it is apparent, nevertheless, that he is rather an equivocal supporter of the Administration, and can hardly be relied upon to stand by it in dealing with the great problem of emancipation which the war has forced upon it and compelled it to solve. Possibly the Senator may yet awake to the necessity of meeting this issue squarely, and will yet be found giving his cordial assistance in behalf of the only policy that can restore peace and unity to the country as a permanent blessing. As to his ridiculous supposition of the war for abolition after the seceded States shall have offered to return—it was hardly worthy of his position to have raised such a man of straw for the fun of fighting it, even in a private conversation. He admits that the President is not such an abolitionist as that, nor does he charge any member of the Administration with being such a creature. The speculation was therefore purely gratuitous. Every intelligent person knows the Government will give the country peace whenever the insurgents stop fighting it; that's the Union platform and policy."

A NEW RECRUIT.—The Dallas Democratic State Journal, which has ever been pretty strongly tinged with copperheadism, has discarded its "Democracy" and now declares a laudable determination to advocate true Union principles. Mr. Bancroft, the present proprietor, says plainly that under previous arrangements the Journal was not a paying concern, and while he promises to exert himself to its utmost to furnish a good paper, he consoles himself with the thought that, should his efforts fail to be appreciated and his journal die, he will have the satisfaction of knowing that it died in a good cause. We congratulate the proprietor upon his patriotism and good judgment.—Times.

UNPRECEDENTED MORTALITY.—In this city, within the past three weeks, the ravages of the disease commonly known as diphtheria have been terrible. This fell destroyer, in almost every case, seeks for its victims among the infantile portion of our community. Not a day has passed for more than a week that we have not heard of from one to half a dozen homes made desolate through the agency of this cruel and relentless disease.—Portland Times.

THE CONTEST IN MISSOURI.—The Leavenworth (Kansas) Conservative says: Missouri is no longer afraid of rebels, or even of the nigger, which, till now these ten moons wasted, was almost the fiercest thing known on that buttered soil. The contest is between immediate and gradual emancipation. That's the fighting word over in Mizou. The "immediate" boys are ahead. They always are.
