Proclamation by the Governor of Oregon.

In accordance with the prevalent usage in many of the States of this Union, and also with the Proclamation of the President of the United States, I, Addison C. Gibbs, Governor of the State of Oregon, do appoint Thursday, the twenty-sixth day of November inst., as a day of Public Thanksgiving and Prayer to Almighty God. He has granted us abundant harvests; health has prevailed in all our borders, and plenteousness in all our dwellings. The terrible calamities of insurrection, invasion and civil war, have been averted, while the blessings and arts of peace have flourished among us.

Besides these common and special reasons for gratitude, there are those of a more general and equally significant character: on sea and land the national arms have been triumphant; our soldiers have proved themselves valiant and enduring; the free institutions bequeathed us by our fathers are still preserved to us, and they live too strongly in the affections of the American people to be seriously endangered by domestic treason or by foreign invasion; and while the expenses of the general Government in putting forth the necessary naval and military power to suppress this most gigantic and atrocious rebellion in the history of the world are extraordinary, mineral resources of unequalled richness and extent have been developed on this coast, and in this State. For these great blessings, which are lustrous even in the dark night of treason and rebellion; for the loyalty of the great body of the American people; for the victories of our armies and navy, as well as the moral triumphs achieved since the present rebellion began, together with the ordinary gifts of a munificent Providence, it is fitting to cherish devout gratitude to God.

I therefore invite and recommend the good people of Oregon to suspend their ordinary business on the day designated, and assemble at appropriate places of convocation to offer praise to God; to exercise repentance before Him for our sins, and to engage in earnest supplication for His blessings still to attend us. And it is also further recommended that, as on former similar occasions, they practically remember the wants of the wounded and suffering soldiers of the Union, in the field and in the camp.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of State to be affixed this 14th day of November, A. D. 1863. ADDISON C. GIBBS.

EMPLOYMENT OF SOUTHERN LADIES.—If one may judge of such a matter correctly from what may be seen in this army daily of Southern ladies, the popular opinion at the North that they are more ornament than useful is a great mistake. No lazy Pounce or Flathead Chief ever depended more completely on the labor of his squaws for a livelihood than does the high born Southern in this section in these evil times. Does he want rations (all of them do) upon which to subsist his family—he sends his wife, if she is pretty, or his handsomest daughter, to negotiate with the nearest division or corps commander. Does he want a pass to go out of the lines, or a permit to remain within them, or a parole to keep out of prison, or a barrel to haul water in, or permission to occupy an abandoned house, or the privilege of vending pies and small beer, or a pair of mules, or a set of harness, or a guard to arrest pillagers—in each and every case he sends his wife, daughter, or sister, if he has one, to make the necessary application to the authorities. If there are no females in his own family, he borrows one, and sends her. The reason for this anomalous state of things is, I suppose, twofold. In the first place, the distinctive traits in the character of a true Southern man are not unfrequently pride and laziness. In the second place, they calculate upon the gallantry of our officers, and understand that but few of them will refuse a pretty woman any reasonable request, while many of them will stretch things to accommodate the fair supplicants for favors. How well these practices comport with true manliness, and how flatly they contradict all the absurd charges against Northern men as brutal ravishers and bloody fiends!—*Correspondence N. Y. Sheriff's Sale.

BY virtue of two executions, duly issued by the Clerk of the Circuit Court, of the State of Oregon for the county of Jackson, on a mandate order and judgment of the Supreme Court of said State, and to me directed; one in favor of Allen F. Farham, and the other in favor of Smith & Trach, and both against Jesse Robinson and others, for the recovery of the aggregate sum of Ten Thousand Three Hundred and fifty-three and forty-six one-hundredths dollars, interest, costs and accruing costs, I have levied upon, as the property of Jesse Robinson, the following described real property, to-wit: Donation Land Claim, known on the maps and plats of the United States, as Donation Land Claim of Alonzo A. Skinner—notification No. 6,366, claim No. 58, township 37 south, range No. 2 west; also one tract of land, containing 160 acres, more or less, the southwest quarter of section 31, in township 36 south, range 1 west.

Also, I have levied upon, as the property of all the defendants, to-wit: Michael Thomas, Tobias Thomas, Henry A. Brothbarth, Joseph Jacobs, Anton Oberst, J. C. Weiss, W. Bittner, V. E. Margraff, Field Langle and Jesse Robinson, donation land claim known on the maps and plats of the United States as Donation Land Claim of John Barrett—notification number 6,200, claim No. 48—containing 329 and 63-100 acres—township 28 south, range one east. Also, Donation Land Claim known on the maps and plats of the United States as Donation Land Claim of William Newhouse—notification 6,194, claim No. 48, township 38 south, range 1 east. Ordinance No. —

IN RELATION TO DOGS.

THE PEOPLE OF THE TOWN OF Jacksonville do ordain as follows:—

Sec. 1. That each and every dog owned and kept within the corporation of the town of Jacksonville, shall be taxed each, to the owner or keeper thereof, two dollars for every six months, (excepting sluts, which shall be taxed two dollars and fifty cents for every six months, to the owner or keeper thereof.)

Sec. 2. And every dog kept or harbored within the corporation of Jacksonville, shall wear at all times a leather or metallic collar around the neck, with the name of the owner or keeper in plain and legible letters, written, printed or engraved thereon. But no slut shall be allowed to run at large when in heat.

Sec. 3. And if any dog be found running at large within the corporation, without a collar as aforesaid, and any slut when in heat as aforesaid, be found running at large within the corporation, it shall be the duty of the Marshal, and lawful for any person, to kill every such animal. And the Marshal shall receive, for each dog so killed by him, the sum of two dollars, to be paid out of the Town Treasury, upon his account being presented and audited by the Board of Trustees.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the Marshal to collect all taxes as aforesaid, and no tax shall be collected for less than six months; and the Marshal shall give his receipt for said tax when paid, in the following form, to-wit:

Received of A—B—, — dollars, tax for six months (as the case may be) upon his, the said A. B.'s, dog, or slut, called —, Marshal.

Jacksonville, Oregon, — 186—.

Sec. 4. Any person owning or keeping any dog or slut within this corporation, refusing or neglecting to pay said tax, as aforesaid, shall be liable to a fine of not more than five nor less than three dollars, which may be on the complaint of the Marshal before the town Recorder.

Sec. 4. All taxes collected by virtue of the provisions of this ordinance (the marshal deducting therefrom twenty-five per cent. of the amount for his fee), shall, within thirty days after the receipt thereof, be paid over to the town Treasurer, for the use of the town.

This ordinance shall be in force ten days from and after its publication.
