Several Districts have failed to report, or their reports do not arrive in time. The report from Jacksonville, though full and explicit in every other part, failed to note the number of voters in the district. The number may be estimated, however, at 275, which number, added to the 460 reported, will make 735 votes in the county.

PACK TRAINS FOR THE NORTH.—We understand that there are now about two hundred pack animals fitting out in this valley for the northern mines. Messrs. Miller and McManis have about forty; McKay and Co. about ninety, and another California train (name not known) of fifty or sixty. Besides the money that these trains will leave in the valley, in exchange for the bacon, beans, flour, etc., which they will carry away, they all propose to go over the new wagon road, and make a plain trail from here to Boise, provided they can obtain a guide and an escort. This is a matter of the first importance to the prosperity of our people, and should not be neglected. If these trains can go through safely and make a profitable trip, it will be but the commencement of a continual stream of gold from the northern mines to the Rogue River Valley. The miners must have provisions, and this valley is the place to get them. Bear in mind that it will be almost impossible to overtake the northern market, as there is now rush to Boise second to none that has occurred on the coast.

Precinct Meeting at Ashland.

Pursuant to call of H. F. Russell, State Committeeman for Jackson County, the Union citizens of Ashland precinct met in primary meeting, at the Ashland school house, on Saturday, March 5, 1864.

On motion, A. V. Gillette was called to the Chair, and G. W. Fordyce appointed Secretary.

On motion of E. L. Applegate, the Chair appointed J. Wagner, A. G. Rockafellow, and W. W. Kentnor, Committee on resolutions.

During the absence of the Committee, E. L. Applegate made a short address on the causes that led to the Union Organization, and the necessity of unity and vigilance. The Committee reported the following resolutions:

Resolved, That we are in favor of a perpetuation of the American Union; the prosecution of the war to the suppression of the rebellion; the complete and triumphant restoration and vindication of the national authority; and (in those States where rebels are in arms for the subversion, overthrow and destruction of all legitimate authority) the guaranteeing of the Republican form of Government, in accordance with the express requirements of the Constitution of the United States.

Resolved, That we repudiate the principle and the practice, as unsound and unpatriotic, of favoring Copperheads with the Government patronage; and at a time like the present, when our country is engaged in a life and death struggle with armed treason, whose sympathizing minions are plotting revolt in our own and sister States, such practice is particularly reprehensible.

Resolved, That it is indispensable to the unity, harmony, and success of the Union organization that we ignore all local issues and political divisions on local interests, which only lure to the advantage and success of factionists and the common enemy.

On motion of W. C. Myer, the report of the Committee was received and the Committee discharged.

On motion of A. G. Fordyce, the resolutions were unanimously adopted, as a whole. The meeting then proceeded to the choice of delegates to the County Convention, whereupon Messrs. B. F. Myer, J. C. Tolman and Samuel Grubb were unanimously elected.

On motion, it was ordered that the Secretary of this meeting send a copy of the proceedings of this meeting to the OREGON SENTINEL, with a request to publish.

THE SLAVE COLLAR.—There is an exhibition in Boston an iron collar taken by our troops from the neck of a poor slave girl almost white, and into whose flesh it had eaten and corroded. S. Tyler Read, Captain 3d Massachusetts Cavalry, took it from the girl's neck on a plantation near New Orleans in 1861. And as no evidence of the demoralizing and brutalizing influence of slavery, it may be stated that this collar was put on her by her mistress—a woman. The collar has three prongs which stick into the flesh. But hear Captain Read's story. He says:

"At the plantation of Madame Contreil, a French Creole, residing just below the city, I found quite a quantity, and was about leaving when a small house, closed tightly and about nine or ten feet square, attracted my attention. I demanded the keys of the strange looking place, and after unlocking double doors, found myself in the entrance of a dark and loathsome dungeon alive with the most disgusting and sickening stench that can be imagined. The hot, close and stifled air puffed out by me until I was obliged to fall back, for fear of suffocation.

"In Heaven's name, what have you here?" I exclaimed to the slave mistress, of whom I had demanded the keys.

"Oh, only a little girl; she ran away. I peered into the darkness, and was able to discover, sitting at one end of the room upon a low stool, a girl about eighteen years of age. She had this iron torture riveted about her neck, where it had rusted through the skin, and lay corroding apparently upon her flesh. Her head was bowed upon her hands, and she was almost insensible from emaciation, and immersion in the foul air of her dungeon. She was quite white, quodroon or octoroon, and previous to her confinement, which had continued as I found, for three months, must have possessed a considerable claim to beauty. Her only crime, according to her mistress, statement was that she had attempted to run away."

It is high time such an institution were wiped from the face of the earth forever.
