POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT, Washington, Jan. 26, 1864. PROPOSALS will be received at the Contract Office of this Department until 2 P. M. of 1st June, 1864, (to be decided by the 10th.) for conveying the mails of the United States in the States of California and Oregon on the routes and by the schedules of arrivals and departures herein specified, on which service is to commence 16th September, 1864, and end 30th June, 1866. Bids are also invited for service to end 30th June, 1866.
