Distinctioned Arrival.—Senator Harding arrived in town Thursday evening, overland from Washington City. The Senator looks as if he bore the ills of Congressional life exceedingly well. He gives a most favorable account of the Oregon interests before Congress. Reports our mail facilities in as good condition as the Government can place them, and that there is a general desire on the part of Congress and the Administration to do ample justice to the growing necessities of our State. Reports a very favorable feeling in Congress towards the California and Oregon Railroad, and thinks there will be no trouble to secure the same Government aid to this road as has been granted to the Central Pacific—this is all we ask. And for all these favors, our State is greatly indebted to the industrious attention and energy of Senator Harding. Mr. Harding has perfect confidence that Grant will speedily crush out the rebellion.

Capt. Medorum Crawford, Collector of Internal Revenue for this State, accompanied Senator H. from Washington.

CERTIFICATE OF INCORPORATION OF THE BANK OF CALIFORNIA.—The appended certificate of Incorporation was filed yesterday in the County Clerk's office. The formation of the new bank is the result of the dissolution of the banking firm of Donohoe, Ralston & Co., which takes place on the first of July. Mr. Donohoe will continue in the banking business, in connection with Mr. Eugene Kelly, of New York, and will occupy the new house located at the corner of Montgomery and Sacramento street.

Messrs. Ralston & Fretz, the other two partners, will continue the banking business at the old stand, corner of Washington and Battery streets, and associate with them the gentlemen whose names are attached to the certificate of incorporation, in the same business, under the title of "The Bank of California." The capital of this new Banking enterprise is two million dollars of paid-up cash in United States gold coin.

We, the undersigned persons, do hereby certify that we have associated ourselves together, and desire to form a company for the purpose of engaging in the business of banking, and that we desire to incorporate the same under the provisions of an Act of the Legislature of the State of California, entitled an "Act to provide for the formation of corporations for certain purposes," approved April 14th, in the year of our Lord 1853, and all acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto, and we certify

First—That the corporate name of the Company shall be the Bank of California;

Second—That the object for which the Company is formed are to engage in and carry on the business of banking to such extent, and in all such branches as may legally be done under the Constitution and laws of the State of California;

Third—That the amount of its capital stock shall be two millions of dollars, with the right to increase the same to five millions of dollars, and the time of its existence fifty years;

Fourth—That the number of shares of which the stock shall consist shall be twenty thousand, of one hundred dollars each;

Fifth—That there shall be eleven trustees, that is to say, D. O. Mills, William C. Ralston, J. H. Thomas, Louis McLane, O. F. Giffin, John O. Earl, Thomas Bell, Herman Michels, A. J. Pope, Wm. Norris, and James Whitney, Jr., who shall manage the concerns of the Company for the first three months;

Sixth—That the principal place of business of the Company is to be located at the city and county of San Francisco, in the State of California.

### Fourth of July.

At a meeting of the citizens of Jacksonville, held at the Court House on Tuesday evening, June 21st, 1864, for the purpose of making arrangements for a proper celebration of the approaching anniversary of American Independence, B. F. Dowell was called to the chair, and Jas. D. Fay was appointed Secretary.

On motion, a committee of three, consisting of Curtis Davenport, L. S. Thompson, Thomas F. Beall, was appointed by the chair to solicit subscriptions, report names of orator, reader of Declaration, place of celebration, etc.; said committee to report at an adjourned meeting next Saturday, at 3 p. m.

On motion, the Committee above appointed was authorized to invite the citizens of the county generally to participate in the projected celebration.

On motion, the Committee was instructed to appoint sub-committees of one in each precinct, to solicit subscriptions.

On motion, a committee, consisting of I. D. Haines, W. G. T'Vault and B. F. Dowell, was appointed to confer with committees of Ashland and Eden, with a view to secure unity in the celebration.

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That in the opinion of this meeting, party politics should be absolutely and entirely excluded from the projected celebration.

On motion, adjourned to Saturday next, three o'clock p. m.

BURNED TO DEATH.—Last Saturday morning the wife of Eliza Smith, of Corvallis, was burned so severely by her clothes accidentally catching fire, that death ensued in five to six hours. She had built up a large fire out of doors and was engaged in washing near it, when by some means the blaze caught to her dress, and before it could be extinguished every particle of her clothing was entirely consumed. Her sufferings during the time she survived are indescribable.
