CERTIFICATE OF INCORPORATION OF THE BANK OF CALIFORNIA .- The appended cer difficate of Incorporation was filed yesterday In the County Clerk's office. The formation of the new bank is the result of the disolution of the banking firm of Donohoe, Rala. ton & Co., which takes place on the first of July. Mr. Donoboe will continue in the banking business, in connection with Mr. Eugene Kelly, of New York, and will occupy the new house located at the corner of Montgomery and Sacramento street.

Messrs, Raiston & Fretz, the other two partners, will continue the banking bushess at the old stand, corner of Washington and Battery streets, and associate, with them the gentlemen whose names are attached to the certificate of incorporation, in the same business, under the title of "The Bank of California," The capital of this new Banking enterprise is two milion dollars of paid-up each in United States gold

We, the undesigned persons, do hereby certify that we have associated ourselves together, and desire to form a company for the purpose of engaging in the business of banking, and that we desire to incorporate the same under the provisions of an Act of the Legis'ature of the State of California. entitled an "Act to provide for the formstion of corporations for certain purposes," approved April 14th, in the year of our Lord 8153, and all acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto, and we certify

First-That the corporate name of the Company shall be the Bank of California;

Second-That the object for which the extent, and in all such branches as may legally be done under the Constitution and Abraham Lincoln. laws of the State of California;

> Third-That the amount of its capital stock shall be two millions of dollars, with the right to increase the same to five millions of dollars, and the time of its existance fifty years ;

Fourth-That the number of shares of which the stock shall consist shall be twenty thousand, of one hundred dollars each;

Fifth-That there shall be eleven trustees, that is to say, D. O. Mills, William C. Ralston, J. B. Thomas, Louis McLane, F. Giffio, John O. Earl, Thomas Bell, Herman Michels, A. J. Pope, Wm. Nor-ris, and James Whitney, Jr., who shall manage the concerns of the Company for the first three months;

Sixth—That the principal place of busi-ness of the Company is to be located at the city and county of San Francisco, in the State of California.


