Tuesday's Dispatch.

Nashville 30th.—Another battle occurred at Atlanta on the 28th. Our loss was about 2000, the rebel's was estimated at 4000. We had 642 dead rebels, and many others were left unhurt. During the fight, our losses were 6000, while the enemy were 10,000. The rebel Generals Lower, Stow, and Long were severely wounded. Everything is progressing favorably. The army is in good condition and spirits. On Saturday morning, 30th.—On Saturday morning, 300 rebels under McCausland, entered Chambersburg and demanded half a million of dollars from the citizens, if not complied with they threatened to burn the town. The request was in writing, and signed by Gen. Early. It is now an established fact that the demand was a pretense to cover the purpose of the marauders, which was fixed, before reaching the town, to burn it without giving any time to remove private property. Scarcely time was given for the citizens to remove their families. They fled the town in about 30 minutes. Two-thirds of the city is consumed, including all the public buildings, stores and hotels. A large portion of the citizens are reduced from comparative wealth to absolute poverty. The loss is about \$1,000,000.

Harrisburg, 31st.—The fact that most valuable portion of the merchandise had been removed from Chambersburg added to the rage and disposition of the rebels, and when this important order was given to fire the Court House. A strong force communicated the flames to the adjoining buildings. A party of soldiers seized several Drug and Chemical stores, and burning the goods and threw them in all directions. Set fire to various parts of the city. The flames soon resulted in one great conflagration, and the scene soon became appalling. The roaring of flames, screams of women and children, and the wailing of the old and helpless, seemed an indescribable scene. One hundred and fifty-five of the noble and elegant public and private buildings were destroyed. The rebels remained long enough, to see the flames get under proper head way, when an alarm was given that Averill was advancing with considerable force, when they fled.

New York, 30th.—Gold 253@255. General Sherman speaking of the fight on the 28th, near New Market, acknowledged defeat, with the loss of four twenty-pounder Parrott guns.

New York, 31st.—The operation had been to withdraw a large rebel force from Petersburg. The 15th corps crossed the James at the election, that was held on the 28th, among the North Carolina troops, withdrawing the intimidation of the rebels, nearly half the votes were cast in favor of the Union.

Headquarters Army Potomac, 30th.—The explosion of a rebel fort, immediately in front of the 9th army corps, came off at half past four this morning. Picketing had been kept up all night, and in fact, at the time the explosion was applied to the mine, skirmishes were still engaged on the line. An immense column of dust rose up three hundred feet into the air. The fort which mounted 16 guns, was reduced to a mass of ruins. Immediately after the explosion, our artillery opened on the rebel position, and the entire line of the 9th corps then charged the rebels, driving them before them to their second line of intrenchments. We captured a number of prisoners, some of whom were shot out of the dirt, badly injured. Prisoners state that only about a dozen remained of their regiment. By 10 o'clock we had captured two other earthworks.

New York, 31st.—A special, dated Washington, says as soon as the explosion of the mine occurred, 120 guns immediately opened, while musketry played in columns fire along the front of the 9th corps of the 15th corps. Prisoners were completely surprised. Those that were mostly asleep at the time, under our works, and in two days more had been ready to blow them up.

Headquarters, 30th.—Reports, that we have possession of the entire line of rebel works, with a large number of prisoners. Our loss in the battle was severe, as the men had to cross a deep field to reach the rebel position. Troops engaged were the 9th corps, ordered by the 18th and 2d, and the 15th in reserve. Firing still going on in great fury and Grant, Meade, and all the Generals are at the front, watching the progress. The Tribune's special says Grant's new flank movement has changed the aspect of affairs. By the 31st is thrown on the north side of the river, while the other side of the river is thrown on the south side of the river, compelling the enemy to govern

Richmond with a large force as well as Petersburg. We have an interior line which compels them to risk an engagement, and the advantage is on our side. Harrisburg, Penn., 31st.—No intelligence has reached here concerning Averill's pursuit. It is believed that he succeeded in punishing McCausland severely. A train of commissary stores left here today to relieve the pressing wants of the people of Chambersburg, who are now crowding the fields and woods.

Washington, 31st.—Friday afternoon Grant had the wagon train of the 6th corps drawn across James River, at James Ford, where the 2d corps had previously crossed to Deep Bottom, where they had a battle with the enemy. The movement of the 2d corps has drawn a considerable force from Lee, and a demonstration with empty wagons caused him to send another large force to intercept an attack from the north side of James river. This feat having produced the desired effect, Hancock marched back, in the darkness of Friday night, to the rear of the army operating in front of Petersburg, where he was posted as a reserve in front of Burnside's corps, which, on Saturday morning, exploded the key to the rebel line, Sherman, with a large force of cavalry, was yesterday operating around the rebel right, and important results are anticipated from his movements.
