Oregon State Sanitary Fair.

To the Citizens of Oregon:

It is proposed to hold a Sanitary Fair at Salem, during the State Fair, commencing on the 27th of September next. In view of the urgent necessity of the Sanitary Cause, and the brievity of the time allowed to make preparations, it is ardently hoped that every friend of humanity, and every lover of his country residing in Oregon, will respond to this call.

We can say to those at a distance, that ample room and shelter will be provided for their contributions.

In suggesting these committees we presume that some will be unable to net; to all such we would say procure a substitute; and should there be sections of country where no committees have been appointed, individuals will please act for themselves, and come to the Fair, and see that their donations are on hand, so that no section of country will be unrepresented.

Oregon has heretofore responded nobly to these calls of humanity, and now is no time to fall or falter, while every telegram brings the sad news of brave men fallen, and the work of carnage and death going on; shall we, while peace and plenty falls to our lot, forget our bleeding country?

To the farmers, we look for help; let your offerings be as generous as your hearts and as a kitchen will be one important feature of the Fair, nothing will be amiss whether from the products of the soil, your dairy or your cattle.

From the merchant and manufacturer, miner and business man, let us have a sample of his wares, or the work of his bands; so that our young State may be fully represented in all her growing wealth and greatness.
