Resolutions of the Union National Convention.

ADOPTED AT BALTIMORE, JUNE 8, 1864. 1. Resolved, That it is the highest duty of every American citizen to maintain against all their enemies, the integrity of the Union and the paramount authority of the Constitution and laws of the United States.

2. Resolved, That we approve the determination of the Government of the United States not to compromise with rebels, or to offer any terms of peace except such as may be based upon an unconditional surrender of their hostility.

3. Resolved, That no slavery is the cause, and now constitutes the strength of this rebellion, and as it must be, always and everywhere, hostile to the principles of republican government, justice and the national safety demand its utter and complete extirpation from the soil of the Republic.

4. Resolved, That the thanks of the American people are due to the soldiers and sailors of the army and navy, who have periled their lives in defense of their country and in vindication of the flag; that the nation owes to them some permanent recognition of their valor, and ample and permanent provisions for those of their survivors who have received disabling and honorable wounds in the service of the country.

5. Resolved, That we approve and applaud the practical wisdom, the unselfish patriotism, and the unwavering fidelity to the Constitution and the principles of American liberty with which Abraham Lincoln has discharged, under circumstances of unparalleled difficulty, the great duties and responsibilities of the Presidential office.

6. Resolved, That we deem it essential to the general welfare that harmony should prevail in the National councils, and we regard as worthy of official trust those only who cordially endorse the principles proclaimed in these resolutions.

7. Resolved, That the Government owes to all men employed in its armies, without regard to distinction of color, the full protection of the laws of war, and that any violation of these laws, or the usages of civilized nations in time of war, by the rebels now in arms, should be made the subject of prompt and full redress.

8. Resolved, That foreign emigration, within the past has added much to the wealth, development of resources and increase of power to this nation, the asylum of the oppressed of all nations, should be fostered and encouraged by a liberal and just policy.

9. Resolved, That we are in favor of the speedy construction of a railroad to the Pacific.

10. Resolved, That the national faith, pledged for the redemption of the public debt must be kept inviolate, and for this purpose we recommend economy and rigid responsibility in the public expenditures, and a vigorous and just system of taxation; that it is the duty of every loyal State to sustain the credit and promote the use of the national currency.

11. Resolved, That we approve the position taken by the Government, that the people of the United States can never regard with indifference the attempt of any European power to overthrow by force and supplant by fraud, the institutions of any Republican Government on the Western Continent, and will view with extreme jealousy, as menacing the peace and independence of their country, the efforts of any such power to obtain new footholds for monarchical government, sustained by foreign military force in near proximity of the United States.

BY CALIFORNIA AND OREGON TELEGRAPH.

TELEGRAPHED TO JACKSONVILLE EXPRESSLY FOR THE SENTINEL.

New York, Simon Draper has been commissioned Collector, vice Barney, resigned. Steamer Costa Rica, from Aspinwall, has arrived with California treasure.

War Department, Washington, 4th.—Sherman's official report of the capture of Atlanta has been received. It was dated 26 miles south of Atlanta, yesterday morning, and gives details of the maneuvers. He first attacked Johnsboro, carrying the works, capturing ten guns, 100 men, and driving the rebels to Lovejoy's Station.

Later dispatches from Slocum, dated Atlanta, the night of the 3d, say the enemy destroyed seven locomotives, 81 cars, loaded with ammunition, small arms and stores. They left 14 pieces of artillery, mostly uninjured, and a large number of small arms.

Baltimore, 5th.—Special to the American, dated rear of Berryville, 4th, says Crook's command, with the 19th and 20th corps, reached Berryville at noon yesterday, and about 4 p. m. heavy skirmishing commenced. The 34th Ohio and 9th Virginia charged the rebels, driving them out of their trenches.

San Francisco, 6th.—The steamer catastrophe has cast a gloom over this whole community. No cause known for the explosion. Steamer boilers were high pressure, and were of five-sixteenths inch American charcoal-hammered boiler iron.

Friday's Dispatch. Headquarters Army Potomac, 5th.—Last night our batteries along the entire line, repulsed the enemy for an hour and a half in honor of the taking of Atlanta.

Nashville, 6th.—Gen. Rosecrans reports that Wheeler's raid is a complete failure. Wheeler is killed and Mashek is reported dead. Damage to the railroad is being rapidly repaired.

New York, 5th.—The U. S. Frigate Niagara seized the rebel pirate Georgia, 20 miles of Lisbon, and put a crew on board her and sent her to New York. The Captain and crew of the Georgia were landed at Dover. The Georgia when seized was under the British flag, and the Captain entered a protest against her seizure.

Springfield, Ill., 4th.—The Democratic State Convention to-day, nominated Jas. H. Robinson for Governor. The resolutions re-affirmed and endorsed the Chicago Platform.

Washington, 5th.—The President has issued orders tending National thanks to Generals Sherman, Canby and Granger, and ordering National salutes to be fired at the arsenals and Navy yards in the United States, in honor of the recent victories.

New York, 5th.—The Matamoros papers declare that the French were defeated in four pitched battles in Mexico. The date is not given. They occurred at Biver in the State of Guerrero. The Mexicans were led by Alvarez. No quarters were given. The prisoners were put to death.

The Telegraph is completed to Olympia Washington Territory.
