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New York, 14th.—Draft been ordered and commenced in the 12th and 13th Districts.

A Washington dispatch of the 12th, says the draft has been ordered to commence in Ohio and other States where quotas have not been filled, on the 19th.

Augusta, Me., 13th.—We have carried the State by largest majority ever known for any party; will probably reach 30,000. We have all Congressional districts by immense majorities; and five sixths of both branches of the Legislature.

New York 14th.—Herald's dispatch from the Shenandoah Valley represent the enemy has moved his lines to the left our forces, and is moving toward the Potowmack, which are at present impassable on account of recent rains. Troops whose time has expired are re-enlisting not singly, but by regtments.

Another of the Herald's dispatches 12th, says another movement has been made; enemy seems to be retiring. Averill is close upon his rear, and indications are that we will have another fight as Averill has reached the enemy's rear infantry line.

New York, 14th.—Post's specials from the army of the Potowmack say: Rebels are feeling of our lines slightly, but have made no general attack at any point. Grant has issued an order that all civilians within our lines in front of Petersburg, who refuse to take the oath of allegiance, shall be sent through the enemy's lines. Also, prohibits the sale of provisions to any such civilians. The draft has been ordered in Delaware & Maryland on Monday next.

Washington, 14th.—No further news from the army of the Potowmack. Works of the enemy on our left and front have been fortified recently. Deserters say they are strengthened by reinforcements from various points, and by large numbers of conscripts who appear to have large deserting propensities.

Grant telegraphs from City Point 15th, that he ought to have the whole number of men called for by the President, in the shortest possible time for the prompt filling of his armies. He says: It will have more effect on the enemy than a victory. They profess to believe that there is such a strong party in the North in favor of recognizing the Confederacy, that the draft cannot be enforced. Let them be undeceived.

Deserters daily tell us their men are universally tired of war; that desertions would be much more frequent, but they believe peace will be negotiated after the election. The enforcement of the draft and the filling up of our armies will save the shedding of blood to an immense extent.

Roseau's Headquarters, Nashville and Mississippi railroad, 8th.—Pennsylvania cavalry, 250 men, surprised and routed Dilley's brigade, 2,000 strong, at Readyside yesterday, killing and wounding many, and capturing 125 prisoners. To-day the railroad was torn up at Belle Buckle, but the damage was trifling. The bridge at Stewart's Creek, which was the only one injured by Wheeler, is rebuilt. The railroad is in good order from Murfreesboro to Chattanooga. Trains left this morning with mail for Atlanta. Rebels are retreating towards McMinnville.

Baltimore, 12th.—No change in history situation at Harper's Ferry. Working parties recommended work on Baltimore and Ohio railroad this morning. It is expected to be running order about Friday. The steamer Fawn was captured on Belmont Sound, by rebels, yesterday.

The following telegram has been received from Sherman: Atlanta, 13th.—I am glad to hear the draft will be enforced. 1st, because we need men; 2d, they come as privates to fill up old tried regiments, with experienced officers already on hand; 3d, because the enforcement of the law will vindicate a power in our Government equal to the occasion. Our Government, though Democratic, should in times of trouble and danger, be able to wield power.

The following information, deemed reliable, has been received to the effect that Fremont has placed a letter of withdrawal in the hands of his friends, who will make it public in proper time, and that before long.

Pittsburg, 12th.—Ex-Governor William H. Higginson nominated for Congress by the Democrats of Cleaveland County. Wm. W. Etchen, of Wilkesburg, was nominated for Congress, by the Union party, in the 12th District. Gallah A. Graw having declined.

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
