EXECUTION OF DESERTERS. HORACE GREELY PREDICTS AN EARLY PEACE.

Opposition to the proposed colonial confederation. 4,000 Southerners' trunks pawned at the hotels in Paris.

Calro, 10th.—Advices from New Orleans report that the gunboat Rattler drifted ashore in the late storm, between Vicksburg and Natchez, and was fired by a gang of guerrillas and burned to the waters edge.

A letter from Mobile to a citizen of New Orleans, says fighting was going on in that vicinity on the 31st. Advices of Dec 27 say Lieut. Wilcox, of the Cheakatum battalion had an interview with Gen. Thayer, on Dec. 26th, under a flag of truce.

St. Louis, 10th.—The Vicksburg Herald of the 6th, has a full account of Grierson's recent raid in Mississippi. The expedition left Memphis, Dec. 21, 2,500 strong.

On the night of the 26th, Esq. Blumes, of the steamer Virginia, cut out from Galveston the schooner Delle, from Nassau, with 120 bales of cotton.

New York, 10th.—The Liberty, with Havana dates to the 4th, arrived. But little news from any quarter had reached Havana.

San Francisco, 11, 9 p. m.—Eastern line down east of Omaha. Yesterday's telegram's quote Gold at 222 1/2, with a downward tendency.

Headquarters, Army Potomac, 7th.—Nothing new to report on the lines in front of Petersburg. Some shelling took place over the appomattox yesterday morning.

New York, 9th.—Advices from Magnesia, La., state that all was quiet. An expedition, consisting of a portion of News' battery and an infantry and cavalry force, had been sent by Gen. Ullman beyond the Atchafalaya.

New York, 10th.—Commercial's special dispatch says Horace Greely is in Washington, arguing persistently his demand for peace, and predicting a speedy termination of the war.

Washington, 9th.—The Senate, in executive session confirmed the nomination of Alexander S. Johnson, of New York, as commissioner for the settlement of the Hudson Bay and Puget Sound Agricultural Companies, vice Daniel S. Dickinson, declined.

New York, 9th.—Considerable opposition is manifested in some of the British colonial provinces to the proposed colonial confederation.

Tribune's London letter says the proceeds of the Liverpool fair will be given to the rebels abroad, who are greatly in need of it.

The Herald's Newbern correspondent gives additional particulars of the Roscoe expedition: Two gunboats were sunk by torpedoes. The river was found to be full of them.

The Richmond Sentinel, of the 6th, says Sherman is doubtless moving on Branchville, S. C.

San Francisco, 10th, 9 p. m.—A general order has been issued by Gen. McDowell, giving the result of the investigation no charges made against Capt. Sullivan by McCarty.

The Missouri State Convention has passed the emancipation ordinance.
