

REORGANIZATION.—That portion or class of the Democratic party, known under the name of "Puritanizing Gammon," are asking for a reorganization of the party on the basis of hatred to the New Englanders, on the ground that their ancestors burnt witches. We understand that another class, known as the "Jew-hating Gammon," are asking for a reorganization of the party, on the ground of hatred to the Jews, because the distant ancestors of that people killed Christ and stoned the Prophets. The great Gammon party is dead. It will be an abortive business, it strikes us, to reorganize a dead carcass. We can't see why these reorganizing gammons can not let the dead alone. The party died on November last, and the funeral obsequies were properly attended to by the American people. It died, say some, of McClellan on the brain. Others are of the opinion that an infusion of the deadly virus of treason killed it. Others, still, say that some bloody Abolitionists braided it out and out. As we are no doctor, we can't pronounce with certainty as to the dire means by which it met its awful fate. But that it is dead is patent to every man. Its former leaders have already become a stench in the nostrils of the American people. To talk about reorganizing such a carcass, is a joke equal to one of Lincoln's best. There are squawks in every profession, but these reorganizing gammons are reptiles to the palm.

MILITARY.—Lieutenant F. B. Sprague, recruiting officer here, has sixty-five men enlisted for the 1st Oregon Infantry. Of this number, Jackson county has furnished her full quota—fifty-five—and the rest we believe are accredited to the quota of Josephine county. Meanwhile Lieut. Underwood has enlisted about twenty men for "C" company 1st Oregon Cavalry, and the work still goes bravely on. Lieut. F. B. White is expected here shortly, it is thought to raise a new company for the Cavalry regiment. Lieutenants White and Underwood have been in the service for the past three years. Both are excellent officers, and deservedly popular with the ranks. "C" company is a very grand rally around the flag boys, whose officers get their recruiting operations in full blast.

Jackson, Josephine and Douglas counties have furnished more men for the United States service during the past three years and upwards, than any other portion of Oregon of the same number of population, and they are still "bully for the Union," and heavy on the natives.

JACKSONVILLE, Feb. 1st 1863. To the citizens of Jackson county: I have the pleasure to announce to the public of Jackson county, that the number of men called for to fill the quota in the first Regiment of Oregon Infantry, have responded to the call, and the quota is now full. In the discharge of my duties as Recruiting officer, I have met with but very little opposition; in fact, I have had the assistance of persons of all political proclivities. They assisted me, not only by their influence, but with their money. It is because I have been so cheerfully aided by private individuals, that I am enabled to make the above announcement. But when all have so nobly and generously aided me in this work, I must not forget that among them were persons who, by giving their time and money, and by canvassing for volunteers, have kept alive the proper spirit. To Harrison B. Osaman of Phoenix, I am under great obligations for exertions in my behalf. To Messrs. Howell, Fay and Jacobs I am indebted for speeches in favor of enlistment. I have received in money contributions about three hundred dollars, of which about two hundred and twenty have been expended in the recruiting service, and for the comfort of enlisted men. The residue, by a vote of the enlisted men of the company, has been set aside for sanitary purposes, for the comfort of sick or wounded in the company. F. B. SPRAGUE, Recruiting Officer.
