GREENBACK DECISION.—We learn from the Review that the case of Tax-payers vs. the Sheriff came up for hearing on the 10th inst., and that Judge Stratton refused to decide on the merits of the case. The following entry in the case was made on the Docket:

Now, at this day this case came on to be heard before his Hon. E. E. Stratton, Judge of the 2d Judicial District, on the 7th day of February, 1865, on petition for mandamus and demurrer of applicants. The Court declining to hear the argument of the counsel, the demurrer was pro forma overruled.

As we understand it, this leaves the Sheriff to collect the taxes in coin, and file the case for the Supreme Court, without a decision from the lower Court.

FELL.—Capt. Sprague's company, consisting of the infantry volunteers of Jackson, Josephine and Curry counties, is now full. A portion of the Curry county quota arrived on last Wednesday; the remainder will be here this evening. The citizens of those counties are entitled to much credit for the energy with which they have acted in raising this company. They had to operate under peculiar disadvantages in not having a recruiting office established here until long after the call was made, and not until the winter rains set in, and the miners were busily engaged in their occupation.

Restoration.—On the 28th of last month, Lieut. Col. G. S. Drew, 1st Oregon cavalry, sent in his resignation, to take effect on the 31st of January. Colonel Drew has been identified with the interests of Southern Oregon from its earliest settlement. He has made a very active, energetic officer, and his loss to the service will be materially felt. He planned and conducted the exploring expedition to the Owyhee last Summer, which promises to be of lasting benefit to Southern Oregon. He starts for San Francisco in a few days, where he expects to be absent several weeks.

Stages to Owyhee.—The Red Bluff Independent says the Californians are getting up a stage line from Red Bluff to Owyhee. The way to beat that is to put on a line direct from the Dalles to Owyhee, over a shorter route and a much better road. Who will do it?—Oregonian.
