## STEAMBOATS ON ROGUE RIVER.

Editor Sentinel.—From the mouth of Rogue River, for some forty miles up, there can be but little doubt that steamboats can be run equally as well as on portions of the Willamette. From thence, it is asserted a wagon road can be graded to reach Camas Prairie in about thirty miles, and that, too, below the deep snow, passable in winter at all times, equally as well as in summer.

This virtually places Jacksonville or Roseburg within one day of tide water or the ocean beach. Why should they not be? The distance in an air line is but a trifle compared with the tortuous and lengthy roads now traveled.

As "Yaquina Bay" is to Corvallis, so is Rogue River to Southern Oregon—both neglected for a time from misunderstanding, but as the citizens of middle Oregon are awaking to the importance of an exporting seaport, so should those of Southern Oregon. Why should not Douglas, Jackson, and Josephine and other counties export produce? Can they compare in distance from the sea coast with Chicago? Of course interior Oregon cannot at present export, because transportation is too costly, the present roads too long. But nearly equidistant from both Jacksonville and Roseburg, it is now proposed or suggested that a road can be commenced, running to tide water in, say seventy-five miles.

This will avoid produce being sent reasonably, and then, too, when it can be used during the heaviest winter. The farmers can do their own teaming. With the combined traffic of Roseburg and Jacksonville passing over it, and a large produce freight, also there can be no reason why it would not be a good investment, even. But a public road would be desirable.

## FROM SURPRISE VALLEY.

We enclose the following items from a letter received from W. J. Allen, written at Surprise Valley, February 15th:

The winter here has been much milder than was expected by any one last Fall. There has not been more than six inches of snow in the valley at any one time; and none to lay on the ground over two days. At no time has the grass been covered with snow. Cattle have done well during the winter. There is no doubt but Surprise Valley will be a fine grain growing country, and there is extensive preparation being made for farming the coming season. There is one saw mill running here now, and a company from Grass Valley have another almost completed. The same company is making preparations to build a large flouring mill the coming summer.

All the best land is taken up in this valley, and there is a company preparing to go to Goose Lake Valley in the Spring. There is also a valley north of this, sixty miles in length, containing much valuable farming land. There will be several teams leave for Rogue River Valley in the Spring after flour, bacon and fruit trees. Flour is worth 20 cts; bacon, none in market; beef, 6 to 8 cts; potatoes, 12 cts; nothing else for sale.

On yesterday we heard that the expressman for this place, was killed, on the head of a small creek, and 40 head of fat cattle and 17 work mules driven off. The citizens of Henry Lake Valley have sent to Fort Churchill asking aid from the soldiers. Have not been able to learn all the facts in the matter yet. When I do, I will advise you.

I understand that a New York company has bought into the Pueblo Mines, and is going into extensive operations in the Spring. We have a fine coal mine here, and there is no doubt but good placer mines will be struck in the Spring, between the south end of Goose Lake and Pitt River. There were several good prospects found in that locality last Fall.

OWNERS.—We are permitted to make the following extracts from a private letter, written from Ruby City, to R. H. Haines of this place, by T. H. Willey, Esq., under date of Feb. 12th:

"There are a great many 'feet' changing hands at present, but money is very scarce; but with the opening of spring, no doubt money will become abundant, as a great deal of bullion has been sent below for coinage. \* \* \*

"There has been some 400 lodes located up to the present time, and I have no doubt but there will be one thousand more the coming season. Out of nearly one thousand assays and tests of quartz that I have made, I have only found two which did not contain gold and silver. The assays that I have made range from \$2 50 to \$25,000 per ton. The rock that has been crushed averages better than the Washoe rock. The lodes increase rapidly in width as they go down. At a depth of 150 feet, the Morning Star is nine feet wide; Oro Fino at the depth of 100 feet is eight and one-half feet wide; the Allison at a depth of 80 feet, will average \$800 00 per ton. A great number of the lodes that are already located will average \$60 per ton. \* \* \*

Good quartz miners readily command \$75 wages per month and board, some get \$100. Flour is worth \$30 per hundred, sugar 60 cts, per lb, bacon do, coffee 75, butter \$1 50, board \$18 per week, with two meals, per day."

SCHOOLS.—We are compelled to post-pone an interesting communication from Rev. M. A. Williams, Supt. of Common Schools. We wish, however, to call attention to some suggestions in it. The first Monday in April is the day for the Annual School meeting. Mr. Williams is desirous that each district should be thoroughly organized, its boundaries designated, and that each receive some permanent name.
