

THE OREGON SENTINEL, RICHMOND FALLEN!! LEE RETREATING! GRANT IN FULL PUR- SUIT.

Newbern 28th.—Sherman's forces are much in need of clothing and other necessaries previous to striking the finishing blow to the rebels. All quiet in front just now. Sherman's headquarters are to be removed from Savannah to Newbern. The World's special dispatch from Newbern gives particulars of Sherman's recent hasty trip to City Point, on a visit to Grant. Sherman on the way remarked that a visit of five minutes would be sufficient to arrange all their plans. While Sherman was in Newbern it was rumored that a proposition for a cessation of hostilities had been submitted to him by Johnston, and his visit to City Point was to lay this before Grant. New York, 31st.—Herald's Washington special says it is now understood from the highest authority, that Secretary Seward has been sent for by Lincoln to come to City Point for consultation, that arrangements are now in progress for a military convention between Grant and Lee, supported on our side by Lincoln and Seward, and on the other by Davis and Hunter.

A proposition to arrange for a State convention to determine whether Georgia shall remain in the Confederacy or return to the Union has just been defeated in the Legislature of that State. The Richmond Inquirer says a heavy column of the enemy moved down Jerusalem plank road, on Thursday of last week. The movement is supposed to be a diversion in favor of Sheridan. It is intended to strike the Weldon railroad, and at the same time to destroy the railroad between that place and Stony Point.

Richmond papers of Wednesday, the 29th, report that Sheridan passed Dinwiddie Court House Wednesday morning they also contain the following:

Mobile 26th.—Preparations for the defense are very complete. Provisions to last six months are in the city.

The Richmond Sentinel has the following in regard to affairs in east Tennessee: Thomas, having transferred a portion of his army to Knoxville, and united with Stein, is said to be moving in the direction of the Virginia line. At last accounts he was half way from Knoxville to Bristol. The expedition was accompanied by an engineer corps of two thousand men, who are engaged in rebuilding the railroad in front as far as the enemy march.

The Tribune's special says the announcement having been made that the Army of the Potomac is about to assume the offensive, it will not be impossible that while the army of the James, on the 27th and 28th, crossed James river and joined Grant in his new movements, and Grant having very suddenly left for the front on Thursday, Sheridan with his cavalry has advanced and has by this time cut the only remaining line of communication with Richmond, somewhere below Banksville and Danville. The rebels on the 26th and 27th had the bulk of their army massed on the right, either in expectation of an attack or preparatory to the evacuation of Richmond.

San Francisco, 3th.—Gen. McDowell received the following: We took Richmond at 8:15 this (Monday) Morning. Captured many guns. The enemy left with great haste. The city is on fire in one place, but we are making every effort to put it out. The people received us with enthusiastic expressions of joy. Grant started early this morning with his army toward Danville Road, to cut off Lee's retreating army if possible. The President has gone to the front.

Legal Tenders 65¢ @ 66. RECRUITING.—Lieutenant J. M. Sutton, former editor of the SENTINEL, is actively engaged in the recruiting service for Capt. Fullerton's company. Those wishing to join a cavalry company would do well to report for service immediately to the above-named gentleman. It is thought by many that no great time will elapse before we shall have trouble with Mexico. It is well enough for us, at least, to be fully prepared for any such emergency.

TRIAL OF BEAL AND BAKER.—The last Statesman contains a long report of the trial of George P. Beal and George Baker, for the murder of Daniel Delany, who was murdered at his residence in Marion county, on the 9th of January last. The evidence is entirely circumstantial; but shows conclusively that the prisoners committed the murder for the old man's money. They are to be hung on the 17th of May next.

MUSTERED IN.—On last Tuesday, Lieut. Kapus, mastering officer for this District, mustered in Capt. Sprague's company of Infantry, and paid the U. S. bounty. Harrison B. Oatman was mustered in as 1st Lieutenant, and Chas. N. Chapman as 2d Lieutenant. There is no fier company of men in the service than Captain Sprague's.

The Jacksonville Union Club went, on Thursday last, and celebrated the capture of Richmond with the booming of canon, and speeches by O. Jacobs, B. F. Dowell, U. S. Hayden, N. Langel, Rev. J. W. Miller, L. S. Thompson, and Judge J. C. Tolman. The club then adjourned until the taking of Raleigh or until peace is made.
