Editor Sentinel: There has been nobody, dead or alive, saved from the ill-fated Brother Jonathan, except the first boat...

No. 22, Woman about five feet seven inches high, stout build, long, auburn hair, good teeth, about 30 years old, fair complexion, had on her person two common breast pins, open-ended thimble, 7 plated spoons, 3 ivory-handled table-knives, 1 \$1,000 greenback, 5 \$20 greenbacks, 7 \$10 greenbacks, 2 \$100 greenbacks, 5 \$50 greenbacks, one \$5 note on the National Bank of Orleans; total, \$1,625.
No. 25, A negro man, supposed to be 25 or 30 years old, about five feet ten inches high.
No. 24, A man about five feet ten inches high, stout build, weight about 160 pounds, light auburn hair, red whiskers and moustache, good teeth, watch and chain, "No. 33548," buckskin parse, with \$420 in coin, and \$85 50 in L. T.
No. 25, Wm. Perkins, of San Francisco.
No. 26, A man, supposed from a Diary on his person, to be a draftsman, and left Springfield June 19th, 1865, sailed from New York, on the steamer Ocean Queen, July 1st, landed in San Francisco, July 25th, had on his person a gold watch, "No. 14755," hunting case, etc.; he was about five feet ten inches high, medium stature, dark brown hair, moustache and whiskers, no hair under his chin, from 30 to 40 years old, plain gold ring on his finger, gold pin in a silver case.
No. 27, A woman entirely naked, except drawers, five feet nine inches high, heavy set, heavy suit of auburn hair, very high forehead, fair complexion, had on a ring with emblem of two hearts united, fine teeth.
No. 28, A fair complexioned man, auburn hair and beard, five feet eight inches high, heavy set, had on gray plaid pants and vest.
No. 29, Mulatto man, about five feet ten inches high, round, smooth face, good teeth, heavy set, weight about 160, supposed to be about 25 years old, had on dark gray pants.
No. 30, A man about five feet ten inches high, weight about 175, dark brown hair, whiskers and moustache sandy, had on speckled cassimere pants, white shirt, one sleeve button with letter "I" on it, supposed to be about 30 years old, no papers.
No. 31, A man about five feet eight inches high, hair and whiskers sandy, light complexion, prominent features, high forehead, bachelor's peak-grey flannel shirt and blue overalls, good teeth.
No. 32, A negro man, about five feet eight inches high, heavy whiskers and moustache, good teeth, about 35 years old, had on a white under waist, buttoned up before, blue pants, and would weigh about 150 pounds.
There are buried between Gold Bluffs and Trinidad, about sixteen bodies, of which we have not yet obtained a description. Gen. Wright's horse and a camel went ashore eight miles north of Trinidad.

Ed. Sentinel: Through the politeness of our Coroner, J. E. Eldridge, Esq., I was permitted to take an abstract from his books, of the names and description of the bodies found and buried by him, in the city burial grounds, from the ill-fated Brother Jonathan, to this date:
No. 1, Mr. Leach, U. S. A.
" 2, E. I. Louate.
" 3, Geo. W. Pollock—put into zinc coffin.
No. 4, D. Parrish—put into zinc coffin.
" 5, George Church (negro).
" 6, A woman, judged to be between 30 and 40 years of age, auburn hair cut short, about five feet four inches high, thick set, fair complexion, upper front-teeth gone, no marks or papers by which she could be identified.
No. 7, Lieut. E. D. Waite, U. S. A.—put in zinc coffin.
No. 8, Man about five feet eight inches high, dark auburn hair, light or small beard on his face, little finger of his left hand gone, no papers on him.
No. 9, Man about five feet ten inches high, slender made, light-brown hair, had on a grey flannel shirt and grey pants, had a baggage check "No. 73," no other papers.
No. 10, Charles Laws (negro).
No. 11, Negro man, about five feet ten inches high, well made, about 35 years old, upper front-teeth wide apart.
No. 12, Man about five feet eight inches high, slender made, hair and goatee sandy, left inscribed in upper jaw gone, high forehead, about 30 years old.
No. 13, Man about five feet ten inches high, light-brown hair, face smooth, no beard on face, no marks or papers.
No. 14, Jas. Nesbit, of the S. F. Bulletin—put in zinc coffin.
No. 15, A. Dwyer, freight clerk of the Jonathan.
No. 16, A man supposed to be Jas. E. Trete, from a telegraph dispatch found on his person from Samuel Hilder, Rochester, dated June 9th.
No. 17, A man supposed to be J. Strong, from a steamer ticket found in his pocket, and J. S. on a handkerchief around his neck.
No. 18, J. L. Anchoise.
No. 19, Mulatto woman, had an emerald ring on her finger, and jet ear rings with gold mountings.
No. 20, Mulatto woman, with a gold watch, guard chain and slides, hunting case, "No. 18030," porte monie, with four brass pins, two ear rings, two studs, a silver finger ring and \$7 50 in coin.
No. 21, Mulatto woman, had in one ear a large hoop ear ring, set with a ruby and pearls, one finger ring, with the letter "O" engraved upon it; one ring set with opal, and one plain ring.

NEGRO SUFFRAGE.

For the information of our readers, we finish the publication, to-day, of the letter of Robert Dale Owen to the President, on the subject of negro suffrage. Mr. Johnson promptly refused to interfere with the South on the subject of negro suffrage, yet it will be the all absorbing question during the reorganization and admission of the Southern States into the Union. The radicals are in favor of universal suffrage, regardless of the color or intelligence of the negro. Mr. Johnson and the conservative portion of the Union, some of the Democratic party are in favor of allowing all to vote who can read and write the English language, regardless of color. In a Republican Government, the true basis of representation is intelligence, and not color. It was thought, at one time, that this question would break up Mr. Johnson's Cabinet, but later advice from the East show that Seward and Stanton are now as likely to remain in the Cabinet as either of them was four years ago. The opposition has had its usual effect—combining together those against whom it was directed.
The Copperhead Democracy need not expect to get aid or comfort at the hands of the President. He is determined that slavery and the rebellion shall be destroyed. John Minor Botts, a distinguished statesman of Virginia, is in favor of negro suffrage. The signs of the times clearly show that Cuffee is to be elevated, and that democracy is to go down. We predict that democracy will be crushed out.
FROM FORT KLANATH.—Mr. George Funk arrived from Fort Klamath last Wednesday evening. By him we hear news from Capt. Sprague's road party. They are getting along very well and think they will be done in about ten days. While on the subject we would say that the regular army rations are sufficient for soldiers, but they don't suffice for men at hard labor in the mountains; also chopping and working in timber is much harder on clothes than a soldier's life. For all this work the men get no extra clothes or rations, and their month's wages will be much lessened to make up the deficiency. Any vegetables that the farmers through the valley might take to the party would be very acceptable. We think such might be done. As the citizens will reap a greater benefit from the road than the military.
Since writing the above, we learn that Mr. Wm. Bybee has started out with a load of Potatoes, and other vegetables, to the soldiers on the road. Mr. Bybee also proposes to start a subscription to repay the boys for their clothes worn out.
SCHOOL EXAMINATION.—On last Tuesday the quarterly examination of Mrs. McCully's School came off, and reflected much credit on that lady for the manner in which she has conducted her institution of learning. The exercises consisted of essays, declamations, reading, spelling, colloquies, etc. The scholars all acquitted themselves well. The essays of Misses Clayton, Bunyard, Bigam, and others, showed fine ability in their composition. The prizes were awarded as follows: Best Reading, Miss Lizette Clayton—medal; Best Writing, Miss Roena Bunyard—gold pen; Most Improvement in Writing, Almina Bigam—medal; Best in Grammar, Miss Nannie Bigam—medal; Best in Geography, 1st class, Miss Roena Bunyard—medal; Geography, 2d class, Master Robert Miller—medal; Best in Arithmetic, Miss Nannie Bigam—medal; Best Spelling, 1st class, tie between Miss Nannie Bigam and Miss Roena Bunyard—each awarded a medal; Spelling, 2d class, a tie between Miss Anna Underwood and Miss Laura Little—each a medal; Spelling, 3d class, Miss Amelia Miller—medal; Spelling, 4th class, Miss Isa McCully—medal.

The Idaho Statesman of 8th says the grand jury of Boise county, after a long session, ignored a bill against Patterson for the murder of Pinkham. TRIBUTE FROM AN OFFICER TO THE PRIVATE SOLDIER.—Major General Slocum, the famous commander of Sherman's left wing, in a reception speech at Syracuse, lately, referred to an article in a Syracuse newspaper, which, he said, "had contrasted the reception given to an officer with that given to a private soldier. Both entered the service from this county—both had been wounded in the same battle and returned under similar circumstances—yet how different their receptions. The officer was met at the depot by a large number of

friends and most cordially greeted. The soldier was met by an only sister, and by her alone accompanied to his home. I presume there are not ten men within the reach of my voice who remember the article to which I refer, and I am very confident no one was more impressed by it than myself. I felt it, for I was the officer to whom allusion was made, and I could not but acknowledge the justice of the article. Our private soldiers unlike those of other countries, enter the service generally from purely patriotic motives. They make equal sacrifices and endure even greater hardships than their officers. In all those traits of character which you delight to honor, the soldier has claims upon you equal at least to his officers. The field of battle is not the only test of courage and manliness in the life of a soldier. The long and fatiguing march, the labor in the trenches, the short allowances of food, are all tests as severe as any presented by battle. I have seen the men of my command, after working waist deep in water, building bridges over the rivers and roads through the swamps of the Carolinas, go quietly to their tent, and, without the change of clothing, make an ear of corn supply the place of the usual ration. I have seen this frequently, and never yet heard a word of complaint. Happily, all these things are now over. The soldier's work is done and well done. They return to you better men, physically and mentally, than when they left you; and I am confident you will find the mass of them unimpaired in morals. Open your shops to them, give them good employment, and I am certain you will find them as faithful as citizens as they have been as soldiers.
