## PROCLAMATION BY THE GOVERNOR.

IN consideration that certain measures, highly important to the interests of the State and Nation, require the action of the Legislature at an earlier period than the regular biennial session; Therefore, by virtue of the authority vested in me as Governor, I hereby proclaim and make known, that a Special Session of the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, will be held at the Capitol of the State, on Saturday the 5th day of December, 1865, at which time and place the members thereof are required to attend.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State to be affixed at the Executive Office in Salem, this 25th day of October, A.D. 1865.
