In consideration that certain measures, highly important to the interests of the State and Nation, require the action of the Legislature at an earlier period than the regular biennial session: Therefore, the Governor, of the authority vested in me as Governor, I hereby proclaim and make known, that a special session of the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, will be held at the Capital of the State, on Tuesday, the 5th day of December next, at which time and place I am authorized to call, and do hereby call, the members thereof, and request to attend.
In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State to be affixed at the Executive Office in Salem, this 4th day of October, A. D. 1865.
