LATEST EASTERN DISPATCH.

New York, Jan. 10th.—London advises of the trial of O. Reardon, late Captain of the Fenians, resulted in a verdict of acquittal. Perfect tranquility prevailed at Cork. Henry Cooke has been gazetted as Captain General.

The Paris Patriot says that France and England have not offered Mediation to Spain in the Chilean question, but their good offices only, which have been accepted by Spain.

The weekly returns of the bank of France show an increase of billion of over thirteen and a half millions. It is confirmed that the French Government has resolved to withdraw from the Extradition Treaty with England. It expires in June next.

Paris telegram says the report of the Financial Minister is expected to be issued on the 20th. It says the year 1865 will close with probably a small excess over that of 1863—4. In consequence of the return of Spanish gold it will show

an excess of thirty million francs to be carried to the sinking fund. Bonos quotations are dull, being quoted at 68 francs and 27 centimes.

Washington, Jan. 9th.—The President to-day, in compliance with a resolution of the House, of the 18th ult., requesting information in regard to the steps taken by the so-called Emperor of Mexico to obtain from the United States the recognition of his so-called Empire of Mexico, and what has been taken in the premises by the government of the United States, transmitted the report from the Acting Secretary of State, and papers by which it was accompanied.

Washington, January 6th.—John Minor Botts has come out in a card denying that he has sought to prevent the admission of Virginia members. He says he has maintained that every representative constitutionally elected, who is prepared to comply with the requisitions of the Constitution and laws, is as fully entitled to take his seat as those now occupying seats.

To have taken any other ground would have been to admit that the States lately rebellious had been out of the Union, and consequently lawful and constitutional—a position that nobody will suspect in occupying.

It is said that Horace Greeley had an interview with President Johnson. The latter expressed to Greeley his desire to end all rapture with the Union party.

No less than fourteen names are on the speaker's list for elaborate speeches on re-

construction.

Members of the Cabinet emphatically say that the President has issued any orders stopping appointments upon the recommendation of members of Congress.

During the week ending to day two million seven hundred and twenty thousand dollars in national currency were issued.

Total circulation now is two hundred forty millions.

The restrictions heretofore put upon the papal clergy of Alabama on account of their refusal to pray for the President have been revoked by General Thomas.

Bishop Wilmer is left to that remorseless conscience consequent on the exposure of a diabolical scheme of his other designing and corrupt minds.

New Haven, January 7th.—The safe of James' Express Company, en route from New York to Boston, on Saturday, was robbed of all its contents, with the exception of two parcels which the thieves in their hurry overlooked. The extent of the loss, as far as can be ascertained, is about \$60,000. The car was probably entered while at the depot in New York. The thieves pried off the lock on the door of the car, and also the locks of two of the company's safes. \$60,000 in greenbacks \$600 in government notes were left by the thieves on the floor of the car. They got out with their plunder at Coleridge. The officials of the company are here investigating the matter. The robbery was discovered until the arrival of the train this city.
