

LATEST EASTERN DISPATCH. SPECIAL TO THE SENTINEL. Dates to Jan. 30th.

Washington, 30th.—The General in command on the Rio Grande, has refused to allow emigrants to leave for Mexico. It is said he is acting under orders from Washington.

The House recommended the Constitutional Amendment to the Committee on reconstruction, without instructions. A resolution admitting Mr. Kyle to the privilege of the floor was rejected; yeas 64, nays 84. Sixty-nine members of the House have made preparations for the delivery of speeches on reconstruction; their names have all been forwarded for that purpose; they will speak in rotation. In the Senate, Fessenden, of Maine, introduced a resolution, which was adopted, authorizing the payment of \$10,000 to defray the expenses of the Joint Committee on reconstruction.

Resolutions have been offered in the House, and referred to the Committee on reconstruction, declaring that the leaders of the rebellion should be tried by a military tribunal, and that it would be inexpedient to try them by civil courts where the jurors would be the equals of the accused in crime.

Extensive forgeries have been discovered in Boston. Forged checks having been paid at different banks without hesitation.

Saturday last, Trumbull, from the Judiciary Committee, reported a resolution that John P. Stockton was entitled to a seat as Senator from New Jersey.

The Pacific Railroad being now over the Kansas River, passengers go through to Topeka, Kansas, without a change of cars.

The Washington correspondent of the Chicago Tribune says: The reported conversation telegraphed yesterday had the President's sanction, he having received the copy and directed it to be sent to the press. The President said he had doubted the propriety, at this time, of making any further amendments to the Constitution. One great amendment had already been made by which slavery had been forever abolished within the limits of the United States, and the national guarantee given that it should never again exist in the land. Propositions to amend the Constitution were becoming as numerous as resolutions at a town meeting, called to consider the most ordinary questions of local affairs. It had a tendency to diminish the dignity and prestige attached to the constitution of the country, and to lessen the respect and confidence of the people in their great charter of freedom, and whenever amendments are made to the constitution it changed the basis of representation and taxation; though he did not deem them at all necessary at the present time, he knew of none better than a simple proposition embracing in a few lines, making the number of qualified voters the basis of representation, and direct taxation upon correct principles. Voters were, for the most part, men who were subject to draft and enlistment when necessary to repel invasion, suppress rebellion and quell domestic violence and insurrection; they risk their lives, shed blood and spend all to uphold the Government, give protection, security and value to property. It seemed but just that property should compensate for the benefits thus conferred by defraying the expenses incident to the protection and enjoyment. Such an amendment, the President also suggested, would remove from Congress all issues in reference to the practical equality of the races. The President depreciated the agitation of the negro suffrage question in the District of Columbia as an entering wedge to its agitation throughout the States; it would engender enmity and lead to a war of extermination between the races; it was ill-timed and would result in great injury to both. Precedence he thought should be given to more important and urgent legislation.

THE RUSSO-AMERICAN TELEGRAPH.—A newspaper correspondent, writing from London, furnishes the following interesting intelligence touching the Russo-American Telegraph: The Western Union Telegraph Company represented now in Europe by Hiram Sibbey, its founder and late President, and the Vice President Mr. Mumford, have just completed the purchases of William F. Healy of London, of 500 miles of iron rod cable, and 25 miles of heavy shore end, as well as 750 tons of No. 9 galvanized telegraph wire. 375 tons of this is now being loaded on board the ship Mohawk, which is to sail from London for Victoria to-morrow, the 15th inst. The remainder of the wire is to be ready for shipment on the 1st of January next. The Russian Government have just assigned a steamer, the Oshotok, to assist in laying the cable on the 6th of August next, and there is now every reason to believe that the entire girde will be completed in less than three years.

HYDRAULIC MINING BY STEAM POWER.—The idea of washing deep banks of auriferous earth with water propelled through hose and nozzle by steam power, has been very thoroughly and successfully tried in the mines near Virginia City, Montana Territory. Machinery of the same character has been introduced in Boise, but of its workings the public is not yet informed. This mode of hydraulic mining gives the miner a chance to work ground which is situated above a line of ditch; it projects the water against the earth with any force which is needed, and the water is thoroughly under control.
