READY MADE CLOTHING.—A California market report of January 9th says: "Clothing for the past year has been in active request at greatly advanced rates. Oregon has been our best customer." The italics of the last sentence are ours. We desire our people to mark the fact that Oregon is California's best customer in ready made clothing! And that, too, when we are manufacturing cloths more than enough to clothe the whole State. At the same time, California is turning her attention to the making of clothing to such an extent that the authority above quoted expresses the opinion that Eastern made clothing must soon be driven out of the market entirely. We have yet to learn any good reason why California should supply herself and neighboring territories, while Oregon remains her "best customer." Why can't Oregon make her own clothing? If California can make that line of business profitable, why cannot Oregon do the same? It is the poorest policy in the world to pay tribute in such matters to our neighbor.

A considerable of the cloth thus made up during the last year, in California, went there from Oregon, paying freight and then returned here as clothing, paying freight again, while it could have been made up here as cheaply, thus saving to the buyer two freight bills at least. Its manufacture here would have given support to a good many people who, in turn, would have called for an extra supply of many things which our producers are now selling at dull prices.

Our people must learn that their truest policy lies in becoming independent in all such matters. It won't pay to buy when we can both save and gain by doing our own manufacturing.—*Oregon Agriculturist and Plowman.*

MANY a person thinks he is honest because he has never cheated. Instead of that, he is only honest because he has never been tempted. What the world calls "inane goodness" is very often a full stomach, and what is termed "vice" is quite as frequently an empty bread basket.

HOW LIFE MAY BE PROLONGED.—M. Robin, an eminent French chemist, in a memoir recently presented to the French Academy, expresses a belief that the human life may be greatly prolonged, and enters into an argument to show that his opinion is based upon sound reasoning. He also gives the result of his personal observations on this subject, and proposes to demonstrate the truthfulness of his position by actual experiments upon animals whose lives are of short duration. His argument is, that the mineral matter which constitutes an ingredient in most of our food after the combustion, is in our system to incrust and stiffen the different parts of the body, and to render imperfect many of the vital processes. He compares human beings to furnaces which are always kindled; life exists only in combustion, but the combustion which occurs in our bodies, like that which takes place in our chimneys, leaves a detritus or residuum which is fatal to life. To remove this he would administer lactic acid with ordinary food. This acid is known to possess the power of removing or dissolving the incrustations which form on the arteries, cartilages and valves of the heart. As buttermilk abounds in this acid, and is, moreover, an agreeable kind of food, its habitual use, it is urged, will free the system from these causes, which inevitably cause death between the seventy-fifth and one-hundredth year.

MARRIAGE BY PROXY.—Marriage by proxy is said to be quite a common occurrence in Mexico, but we believe it has not been practiced to any extent in California; but we being a progressive people ever ready, to seize upon and adopt as our own everything of worth, we may soon be induced to accept the Mexican plan as an amendment to ours. At any rate, an attempt has recently been made in this city to set the ball in motion. A gentleman engaged in business here was engaged to be married to a young lady, but before the day fixed upon had arrived he was compelled to make a trip to Mazatlan. Bidding his intended to be of good cheer, and promising to be back by the day appointed for the wedding, he took passage for Mexico. Mac proposes but God disposes, and in this case, although the gentleman used his utmost endeavors, he could not so arrange his affairs as to return by the time agreed upon, but he could not bear to have his intended disappointed, and in order to remedy the matter he sent a power of attorney to a friend of his, with instructions to marry the girl for him and in his name. The friend, desirous of accomodating the absent one, yesterday applied to the County Clerk for a license. The matter is in abeyance, we believe.—*S. F. Call.*
