History makes known that every great war has been followed by pestilence, famine or national moral degeneracy. War, being itself a violation of the natural laws intened for the government of mankind, it follows that whatever infringement of those inflexible rules, must be punished as surely as are infractions of the laws of health by individual men. Every physical pain which humanity suffers, every sorrow by which it is overcome, is presently or remotely the resentment of some affront offered to the unbending majesty of Nature; and as with separate individuals, so with collective na-

After forty years of comparative quiet, interrupted by no war of great magnitude and duration, the American Conflict stirred up the war-spirit in Europe, to be so memorably quenched at Sadowa. It inspired the French Emperor with schemes of conquest, to be ignominiously abandoned, with heroic republican Mexico at his heels. It woke the drooping genius of Ireland, which will yet split the British throne, as it was cloven by the Scottish claymore. It roused the slumbering heroism of historic Crete, to gaze from the cloudy heights of Mount Ida at the slow, but certain, downfall of the crumbling Crescent. It revived in degenerate Rome somewhat of the spirit of the Cæsars, and extending far to the southward, the angry shrick of the eagle evoked the war-cry in the home of the condor. In addition to all this, it has spread abroad the sentiment of political and social revolution, which now fills the British monarchy with apprehension and dismay. The spectre of Reform, invoked by the grim enchanter, will not be put down by governmental exoreism. It stalks abroad to inspire the sinewy legions of the most enlightened and warlike kingdom of Europe. It rides the popular waves with the audacitiy and indestructibility of the ancient Sea-Kings; and inspired by the kindred genius of Republicanism, it shakes at the aristocratic fabric of ages, with the courage of an Ajax and the strength of a Hercules .- S. Confederate Army: DEAR SIR: Your letter of September 14 is received. I approach a question involving the title of a horse with great diffidence, for the laws of war, that mysterious code of which we talk so much but know so little, are remarkably silent on the "horse." He is a beast so tempting to the soldier-to him of wild eavalry, the fancy artillery, or the patient infantry-that I find more difined beast than in paying a million of "greenbacks;" so I tear I must reduce your claim to one of finance, and refer you to the great Board of Claims in Washington. That may reach your JACONET AND SWISS case by the time your grandchild becomes a great grandfather. Privately, I think it was a shabby thing in the scamp of the 31st Missonri who took your horse, and the colonel or his brigadier should have returned him; but I cannot afford to undertake to make good the sins of omission of my colonels and brigadiers, much less of those of a former generation. "When this cruel war is over," and peace once more gives you a parish, I will promise, it near you, to procure out of one of Uncle Sam's corrals a beast that will replace the one taken from you so wrongfully. But now 'tis impossible; we have a big journey before us and will need all we have, and I fear more too; so look out when the Yankees are about, and hide your beasts, for my experience is that all soldiers are very eareless in a search for title. I know General Hardee will confirm this my advice.
