ASSAULT WITH A DEADLY WEAPON.—Thos. Greenwood, alias "Dixie," was arrested on Wednesday evening last, on the charge of assault with a deadly weapon. He had his examination on Thursday morning, before U. S. Hayden, J. P. The evidence developed the facts that about 6 o'clock, on Wednesday evening, he went into the New State Saloon in a state of intoxication, and commenced using profane and obscene language, and was ordered out of the house; but not going, he was put out by force. He then armed himself with a six shooting pistol, went back into the house, and exclaimed with an oath, "I have got you," at the same time drawing his pistol, cocking and leveling it at a group of persons sitting there quietly chatting. The pistol was wrested from him before he had done any injury. He was bound over to appear at the next term of the Circuit in the sum of \$500. He has subsequently been discharged, on condition that he leave this vicinity.

NOTABLE DEATH.—Leonard McClure, late Editor of the *S. F. Times*, died in San Francisco on Friday, the 14th inst. Mr. McClure was, in 1865, a member of the Colonial Legislature of British Columbia, and will be remembered as the gentleman who spoke for seventeen consecutive hours, in order to occupy the Legislature until its closing hour and stave off a measure that would have been extremely oppressive and obnoxious to the people. He was a native of Belfast, (Ireland) and brought up to the newspaper business in that city.

THE CALIFORNIA CANVASS.

The exciting canvass in our neighboring State is beginning to attract much attention; especially among the Union men of Oregon. The action of the Union convention, lately held in Sacramento, seems to be fully sustained and endorsed by the whole of the country press, in the interest of the Union party; but the disaffection of two such powerful papers as the *Union* and *Bulletin* threatened to result in the demoralization of the Union party. While charging corruption and fraud in the primaries against Gorham and his friends, the disaffected portion of the press have been forced to acknowledge that Gorham is second to no man in the State in point of ability, and to recognize in him a powerful and ardent politician. With the bitter and strenuous opposition of the two leading papers of the Union party, it would be quite doubtful whether Mr. Gorham could be elected; but it seems impossible that these papers are prepared to destroy the party which they themselves have done so much for, and to accept placidly the inevitable loss of their immense influence in its defeat. They may destroy the Union party in that State, but certainly cannot, at present, build up a new or third party that will have any prospect of success. With the quiet submission of the *Union* and *Bulletin*, without either their assistance or opposition, we consider the chances for the election of the whole Union ticket morally certain. A majority of fifteen or twenty thousand is hard to overcome, and the number of those who are anxious to return to the Democratic fold is not so large as to give any reasonable assurance of success for that party. Already, these two papers have shown unmistakable signs of weakening, and, although not disposed to sustain the nominations, will certainly discontinue their opposition. In the candidate for Governor, they have an opponent of indomitable pluck, backed by wealth, and who has shown by his ability in securing the nomination, that he is able to gather its fruits in a triumphant election; and from our point of view, we do not doubt his complete success. The trouble among the Union men of California is additional proof that the greater and more powerful a political party becomes, the greater and the more dangerous are the elements of weakness it contains. The Union men of that State will do well to heed the lesson and accept the ticket offered them, rather than abandon all that has been gained, to a party with so damnable a record as that of the Democracy. Let the Union party suffer defeat through their own folly, and they will reap their reward in seeing a perfect official saturnalia among the hungry cormorants who have been so long waiting to regain control of that State.

BRICK POMEROY AND HIS PAPER GET A "NOTICE."—The following "first-rate notice" of the *La Crosse (Wisconsin) Democrat*, edited by a fellow who calls himself "Brick Pomeroey," is from the local columns of the *Montana Post*. The notice is a model of Pomeroey's style, and a rough but very accurate description of his sheet. It is headed "To whom it may concern," and reads as follows:

Came to this office by mistake, one *La Crosse Democrat*, edited by Brick Pomeroey. Description—The most contemptible specimen of journalism on this continent; obscene, profane, libelous, and filthy; insidious as a serpent, venomous as a tarantula. Contents—Beast Butler, BRICK POMEROY, Treason. "Only this and nothing more." Character of "Brick," compiled from his paper—A conceited rebel dog; too cowardly to fight for the South, and too big a fool to keep his mouth shut when they are whipped; an accomplished idiot and manipulator of brotzel slang, coupling by his nouns a string of adjectives, like filthy cattle cars after a locomotive. Having exhausted his supply of vituperative epithets and Five Point's billingsgate, he has gone to New Orleans to hang around the back of rebellion, to glean and sop up the slang of every greasy seahory and slop house, to give tone to his paper. The paper claims an immense circulation. So had the frogs and lice of Egypt, and the small-pox and cholera, and the *Venus Mercenary*. As long as men will stone a Sunday-school procession, and seduce women, commit murder, roll in the gutter, talk treason, engage in rebellion, etc., it will probably be well patronized. Their charges will be hereafter as follows: **FOR ASSAYING DEPOSITS FOR UNPAID GOLD BARS.** One-eighth of one per cent. (hereafter a quarter) for all amounts over \$1,000, and two dollars for any smaller sum. Returns made in twenty-four hours.

FOR ASSAYING DEPOSITS FOR UNPAID SILVER BARS. Two dollars for the gold contained, up to \$1,000, and one-eighth of one per cent. for all amounts over that sum, and one per cent. on the silver contained. Returns made in twenty-four hours.

CHARGES AT U. S. BEAUCHAMP MINT. For the convenience of those not familiar with the terms of the Mint, we subjoin the table of charges now in force at that institution:

For refining bullion, under 300 parts gold, 3 cents per ounce; for refining bullion from 300 to 600 parts gold, 5 cents per ounce; for refining bullion from 600 to 750 parts gold, 7 cents per ounce; for refining bullion from 750 to 880 parts gold, 11 cents per ounce; for refining bullion from 880 to 949 parts gold, 14 cents an ounce; the charge for coinage is half of one per cent., and the charge for making fine silver bars, the same.

Comparing the net value of deposits for coinage, with the proceeds of unpaired gold bars sold in the market—assuming that the bars have cost 3/4 of one per cent.—they must be sold at the following per rates to equal the return which would have been made had they been deposited for coinage:

850 par to equal Mint return, at refining charge of 14 cents.

845 par to equal Mint return, at refining charge of 11 cents.

865 par to equal San Francisco A. & F. Works return, at refining charge of 8 cents. m330 june
