

Public Speaking.

Senator Geo. H. Williams informs us by letter that he will visit Southern Oregon next month, and will address the citizens at the following times and places:

Waldo, Josephine Co., July 18th.
Jacksonville, Jackson Co., July 16th.
Roseburg, Douglas Co., July 20th.
The speaking will commence at 1 o'clock P. M. of each day.

MAMMOTH REMAINS.—On Monday, the 24th inst., a company of Chinese miners discovered part of the remains of some large animal, probably a Mammoth or Mastodon, while drifting in Missouri Gulch, about three miles from town. On Tuesday we visited the place, in company with Mr. J. M. Sutton, and had the satisfaction of digging out a piece of a tusk, about three feet in length, seven and a half inches in diameter, and weighing about seventy-five pounds. Lying on the ground was a piece of tusk, taken from the drift about 20 feet below the surface, and in a fair state of preservation, which measured six feet and a half in length, and would probably weigh one hundred pounds. From the appearance of the latter, we should judge that when on the animal, it was not less than eight or nine feet in length. Two teeth were found, that show that the jaws from which they came belonged to an animal of extraordinary size. They are molars, have the appearance of being the back teeth from the lower jaw, and are in a remarkable state of preservation, the enamel on them being almost perfect, but much discolored by contact with the blue clay in which they were imbedded. The upper surface of the incisor portion measures seven and a half inches in length, by three and a half in width, each tooth weighing three pounds—from the lower edge of the enamel to the end of the root, it measures about six inches, and it is difficult to realize the immense jaws to which they belonged.

A close examination of the teeth, and reference to Cuvier, proves conclusively that they belonged to a Mastodon, the bones of which have never been found except on this continent. In addition to the above, a rib nearly seven feet long, a portion of one of the shoulder blades, and the upper bone of the fore leg have been found; in the latter, the articulation is nearly perfect, and its immense size would lead us to believe that the animal must have been eleven or twelve feet in height. We have no room for speculation as to how or when these remains of a gigantic and wonderful race of animals were left here; but if we admit the correctness of scientific theories we can calculate that they have been here over four thousand years. They are now in possession of Mr. Sutton, who intends preserving them for the gratification of those who are curious in such matters.

A LONG STAY.—About four years since, Mr. Edwin C. Smith, of this town, was on his way to Fort Klamath, and while camping out and sleeping on the ground an insect of some kind got in his right ear, and caused him the most intense pain, but which he relieved in a few moments, by pouring water and melted lard into the organ. Mr. Smith has ever since experienced a curious sensation in that ear—as if it contained a drop of water—but repeated examinations failed to show any cause for it. On Sunday morning last he felt an unusual irritation in his ear, and with the assistance of a friend finally extracted therefrom a small beetle, commonly called a "snapping bug," nearly half an inch in length, and giving evidence of having been dead a long time. He now enjoys perfect relief from the unpleasant tenant.

WE "PICK ONE."—Our neighbor has been complaining that items from the *Press* are copied and credited to the *Sentinel*, and gets even by publishing editorial from us, and crediting—"An Exchange." We find on the outside of last week's *Press* an article entitled "Advertising," published originally in the March 9th number of this paper, and we ain't a bit mad about it. MORE CATTLE.—A drove of over three hundred head of cattle passed through the valley on Sunday last, driven from the Umpqua Valley. As near as we can learn, over five thousand cattle have passed through this valley for California and Nevada, this Spring.

BREAKWATER.—Lieutenant Huer has just visited Crescent City, for the purpose of looking after building material for a breakwater at that place. He has found plenty of suitable rock close to the site of the projected work.

DISTINGUISHED VISITOR.—It gives us pleasure to announce that Senator Williams intends paying Southern Oregon a visit next month. It is scarcely necessary to bespeak for Geo. H. Williams a becoming and enthusiastic welcome. He comes back to us with clean hands, with unshaken fidelity, and with a record as pure as that of any public man of the day. It is needless to say that our Senator will be an object of interest to both parties, and will command a respectful hearing. He comes to us fresh from the arena of political strife—fresh from every day contact and association with the leading spirits and illustrious statesmen belonging to both the great political parties, and himself a prominent actor in every measure calculated to restore unity and bring peace to the country. Mr. Williams has undoubtedly seen the great and important questions of the day from a more favorable point of view than we, at this distance, possibly could, and can no doubt enlighten and edify us. Many of us have heard our Senator speak—many of us have not, but none are unaware that he is one of the most forcible and convincing speakers in the Senate, and who can be listened to by those of adverse opinion with interest and attention. Reference to his note, published at the head of this page, will show that he will speak here on the 16th ult., and we hope that every Union man in the county, who can conveniently do so, will join in giving him a proper reception.

THE CELEBRATION.—The exercises on the coming Fourth promise to be the most interesting that have yet been got up in this section of the State. One of its most attractive features will be the "Triumphal Car," containing two young misses, representing the Goddess of Liberty and the Angel of Peace—two boys representing the Army and Navy, and thirty-eight misses representing the States and the Territory of Montana. The Truck of the Hook & Ladder Co. has been kindly lent for the occasion, and will make a car twenty-five or thirty feet in length, which will be drawn by four gray horses, and be under the management of Mr. R. S. Dunlap and Mr. E. C. Brooks, two of the most accomplished vocalists of this place. A full programme of the exercises of the day will be found in another column, and people are again reminded that all those who can possibly do so, are expected to bring their dinners with them to the ground. Let every one bring plenty, so as to be able to divide with any hungry stranger who may not be lucky enough to have his dinner along. The day's entertainment is to close in the evening with a splendid display of fireworks.

ROGUE RIVER WOOLLEN FACTORY.—Work has been commenced upon the factory building. The foundation is being dug, and the contracts for the building materials are being let. The factory building proper, will be 72 by 54 feet, four stories high, including basement and attic. A turbine wheel, twenty-three inches in diameter, will furnish power for turning the machinery—it is fifty horse power. The basement room will be twelve feet in the clear, and contain the wash tubs, fulling machines, shears, presses, etc. The second floor (first floor proper) will contain the looms. This floor will be 72 by 54 feet, and 12 feet high. The next above will be the same size, and contain the carding machines and spinning jacks. The attic will contain the picker and wool bins. We understand it to be the intention of the Directors of the company to get the building finished and ready for the machinery this season. When completed, it will be the largest house in the county.

TERPSICHOEANS.—The votaries of the Madam—not Madam Guilleyle, but Madam Terpsichore—will remember that Mr. Horne will give a Grand Ball on the evening of the Fourth, for which he is making extensive preparations. Madam De Guilleyle also informs her friends that the splendid Shutz Hall will be at their disposal on that evening, and no pains will be spared to make them comfortable. Between the two halls, if people cannot enjoy themselves they can take a trip to Kirbyville, and share the generous hospitality of Mr. Lind, who also offers splendid inducements to pleasure seekers.

ASHLAND MILLS.—During the week we had the pleasure of visiting this flouring mill, which is owned by Messrs. Wagner & Klam. This is quite a large building—two stories high, besides an attic. The inside machinery was all put in new last summer, at a cost of nine thousand five hundred dollars. The motive power is obtained by a 24-foot over-shot wheel, which runs two sets of burr-stones, two sets bolting apparatus and two sets of machinery for elevating and cleaning wheat. The machinery is of the first order, and is perfect in all its workings. The capacity of the mill is 20,000 pounds of flour every twenty-four hours, and we are told by consumers that Ashland flour is the best found in the market. The proprietors intend to further improve their mill this summer, by putting in a new and improved smut machine. When this is done it will be the finest mill in the valley.

ROSEBURG OREGON, JUNE 25th, 1867.
—Mrs. Margaret Ireland, of this place, died on the 21st, after a lingering illness of two or three years. She leaves a husband, five children, and numerous friends, to mourn her loss.

A teamster, by the name of James Simpson, lost a horse, on the 22d, in the South Umpqua River. The horse balked in the middle of the stream, and threw himself down; and, although the water was very shallow, he persisted in his obstinacy, and drowned in spite of the efforts that were made to save his unprofitable life.

Louis Billieu and George Finch, two celebrated prospectors, leave town to-day, with a view of prospecting the region of country between the head of the Willamette and the North Umpqua Rivers.

We learn that extensive preparations are being made to celebrate the coming Fourth of July at Yoncalla, Oakland and Jenkins Ferry, and that Hon. J. F. Gatzky, J. F. Watson and B. Herman are named among the speakers.

Capt. Cowles is skirmishing in the country at present, in the vicinity of his old home, in "Missouri Bottom." A few weeks in the country will be beneficial to his feeble condition of health. On Sunday last, (during the hottest weather of the season.) On Calapooia Creek, Rev. J. W. Miller married Mr. W. B. Clarke, and Miss Catharine A. Stephens, all of Douglas County.

Whooping Cough is prevailing to quite an extent at Wilbur and vicinity.

NEW REAPER AND MOWER.—Mr. O. Jewell, traveling agent of Treadwell & Co., San Francisco, was in town this week, and set up one of the Kirby combined reapers and mowers. We went into the field to see it work, and must say that from our limited knowledge of farming machines, that it was superior to any thing we had seen. When used as a mower, it has a rotary, self-feeding apparatus, which makes the grain in bundles, every ten or twenty feet, as desired, thus saving one hand, which is no small item here. The machine is very compact, and adapts itself to almost any kind of ground. The advantages claimed are, that it does not easily get out of repair—has no side draft and runs very light. Mr. James T. Glenn, of this place, is agent for the machine, and farmers can get harvesters without any difficulty by making application to Mr. G.

LIBERTY POLE.—A flag staff, about one hundred feet in height, is to be erected to-day in the Court House square. It is to be erected by private contribution; Messrs. Bilger Miller and Orth having taken the matter in hand. This should properly have been done by the county or town, but the commissioners failed to see any necessity for a pole on the county grounds—on which to display the National emblem, and the town Trustees declined to make an appropriation, for the reason that the town had no suitable place on which to erect it. All right, however, we are to have a liberty pole on which to float the Stars and Stripes—"and long may they wave."

JOSEPHINE COUNTY.—The smelting furnace of Messrs. Crandall & Co., near Kirbyville is a success. About 500 lbs of copper was yielded at the first run. The ore is over 90 per cent pure metal—a small test of 30 pounds yielding 16 pounds of copper. The success of this enterprise is very encouraging, showing as it does that the mineral wealth of Southern Oregon is a fixed fact and requiring only a reasonable amount of industry and capital for its development. There are several well defined leads of copper ore in Josephine supposed to be equally as rich as that being rich as that being worked by the above company.
