Douglas Co. Correspondence. ROSEBURG, Sept. 9th, 1867. L. T. Thompson and a young Miss Wright, of Cole's Valley, in this county, mysteriously disappeared on the 27th ult., creating quite a sensation in the neighborhood.

T. P. Sheridan, and family, returned from the Atlantic States, on the 30th, after an absence of several months. They were passengers on the ill-fated Santiago De Cuba, and were thrown ashore on the Jersey coast.

Deaths among children are of quite frequent occurrence in this valley, and are generally caused by whooping cough.

There is a large amount of business being done in this valley the present season. Heavy freight wagons are arriving and departing every day.

The rich silver leads in the mountains between the Willamette and Umpqua rivers are still attracting considerable attention. Some specimens brought in to-day certainly contain a vast amount of mineral substance of some kind, which resembles gold and silver.

The Democracy had a drunk last Friday night, over the news of the California election. Their noisy frolics are of common occurrence in this town, but this is the first excuse they have made for their midnight revels.

Rev. D. C. Haynes, a traveling clergyman from the East, was in this place Sunday last, and preached an elegant sermon to a large congregation. In the evening he preached a sermon for the benefit of the freed-men—whites and blacks—of the South; but a certain portion of his congregation withdrew, and for a time appearances indicated that evil was contemplated by those who, under the plea of fun, are ever ready to do mischief to those traveling strangers whose business calls them temporarily among us.

The National Debt.

When the Volunteer force of the army of the United States was disbanded in 1865, the Secretary of the Treasury announced that the National Debt, exclusive of the cash in the Treasury, amounted to \$2,757,803,686 91. On the first inst., two years and one month after the first announcement was made, Secretary McCulloch reports the debt to be \$2,492,783,365 05—a difference of \$265,020,321 86. This difference is the amount by which the public debt has been reduced, and it is a showing beyond anything that has ever been known. We are actually paying off the debt at the rate of \$10,000,800 per month. At this rate it will take only ten years to cancel the whole amount. But we hope to do even better than this when the expensive war on the Plains is brought to a termination, and the Southern States shall have regained their former prosperity, so that they can help discharge the debt. The Oregonian in speaking of this subject, says:

There are those who, for small political purposes, take every opportunity to exaggerate the burdens of the debt, and even to assert that it can never be paid. Unscrupulous newspapers of a partisan character often declare the debt to be twice as large as it really is, and endeavor to lead their readers into a belief that "the party in power" is still piling new heights upon the mountain of debt with no expectation or desire of paying it. Of course intelligent people will not be deceived by these statements; but the readers of this sort of journals are not always of the most intelligent class. This is simply one of the methods whereby power play upon the prejudices of the ignorant to accomplish their purposes. Hardly more than a week ago we found an Oregon editor gravely or rather impudently, arguing that the "Radicals never intended to pay the debt," though they have been paying it at the average rate of three hundred and fifty thousand dollars a day ever since the close of the war. It is the delight of this class of writers to delude those who are so unfortunate as to be their readers into the belief that the debt, under the management of "the party in power," will be a perpetual incumbrance upon the industry of the country,—hoping thereby to produce a distrust which will redound to the advantage of their party. The favorable statements which are made from time to time, showing a steady reduction of the debt, would completely discomfit any set of men less brazen or unscrupulous than they; but observation has shown that these writers will stick at nothing in the shape either of ingenious misstatement or positive falsehood which they think themselves able to turn to party advantage.

CROSS-WALKS.—Mr. M. A. Berry is now having the flag-stones for the street crossings quarried, brought into town and deposited at the various points where they are to be laid down.

DON'T TAKE TOO MUCH CREDIT.—The Democracy throughout the State are rejoicing and making great demonstrations, over what they are pleased to term a "Democratic victory" in California. This is an entire mistake. There was no victory gained in California by the Democrats at the late election. It was a Union failure. The Democracy could no more have succeeded at the late election than they could at Richmond, in the spring of '65, when Grant was after them. All the California papers concur in saying that not more than two-thirds of the Union strength was called out on the day of election. When such a state affairs existed, it is not at all surprising that the Union party failed. We think it altogether probable that at the coming Judicial election in California, the now exultant Democratic party will be hurled from its elevated position, and made to take the back seat. It has occupied for the last five years. We feel confident that such will be the case if the Union party only does its duty.

THE BOOK KEEPERS.—We stepped into Mr. Wade's commercial school during the past week, and found the class progressing finely; in fact were so much pleased that we determined to make one of their number. Mr. W. is a fine book keeper, not only has the theory but had the practice, and possesses the faculty of making himself understood. We do not see any reason why our young men should seek further for the opportunity to get a good, practical knowledge of this business. They will certainly never get it cheaper, and we advise every man and every youth, that can, to avail himself of this golden opportunity to acquire a thorough knowledge of this important branch of business.

Mr. Randall informs us that the yellow jackets can all be destroyed or driven away from any house, in from one to two days, by procuring a piece of rabbit or deer meat, fresh and raw, and exposing it where these insects can get at it conveniently. This attracts yellow jackets more than anything else, from the fact that it is very tender; when it is covered with them, pour on scalding water. Mr. Randall states that he has seen this plan tried once this season, and frequently, in '53-5— at which time these pests were so numerous that they were an absolute Plague—and it always met with success.
