

Proceedings of the Board of Trustees

JACKSONVILLE, Sept. 25, 1867.

A called session of the Board of Trustees was held this evening at the usual hour. All the members present. The meeting was called to order by the President, D. Linn, and the minutes of the two preceding meetings read and approved. The reports of committees and all unfinished business continued. Bill of stationery, for \$11, presented and referred to the usual committee. A petition from Helms, Hubbard, Davis, and others, residents and property holders on Oregon Street, praying the Board to allow gravelled walks to be made instead of plank, as required by the present ordinance, was presented. The Board refused to transact any ordinary business, and the petition was, on motion of Mr. Martin, laid on the table.

A special election, for a Town Trustee, was ordered to be held Oct. 8th proximo, to fill the vacancy in the Board of Trustees, caused by the death of Mr. Love, and W. G. T. V. Vault, Jesse Robinson and N. Langel were appointed Judges of election, and C. W. Kahler and Geo. P. Funck clerks.

Board adjourned to October 9, 1867, at 8 o'clock P. M.

QUARTZ.—Last week, Mr. Oliver, living across Bear Creek, brought from a ledge on Grave Creek a load of quartz rock—about 1500 pounds—to the mill on Jackson Creek. Col. C. S. Drew crushed it this week, and obtained \$14 87, very fine gold. At this rate it will pay nearly twenty dollars to the ton, and is considered a good prospect. No gold is visible in the rock. We understand it is the intention to test the ledge further, and it sufficient encouragement is met with, a mill will be erected at the ledge.

SERIOUS INJURY.—On Saturday last, Mr. O. D. Hoxie was severely injured by the kick of a horse. The "cock" of the animal's shoe struck Mr. H. in the mouth, splitting both the upper and lower lips completely in two. He rode into town, and was attended by Dr. Greenman, who sewed the severed parts together neatly and artistically.

RETURNED.—Mr. Wm. Bilger, who was formerly engaged in merchandising at the forks of Jackson creek, has returned to this county. Mr. B. took a trip to the Atlantic States last summer, and has wisely returned here with a partner of the right kind, to share the prosperity we hope he may enjoy. He has ordered a stock of goods for Willow Springs, where he intends locating.

CEMENT.—Col. Butterfield, who is sinking on a cement bed, near Waldo, sent us a specimen of the cement, which was found 25 feet below the surface. Col. B. is quite sanguine that the cement will pay for crushing, and has ordered machinery for that purpose. Mr. Colwell informed us on Wednesday evening, that a few boulders and some gravel were being struck in the bottom of the tunnel, but that the cement still continued.

GONE BELOW.—Mr. D. Linn, of the firm of Linn & Hall, left for San Francisco on Thursday morning. Mr. L. intends purchasing a large stock of furniture and material for their Cabinet Shop, and also a first class planing machine, which indicates that business is thriving, and the demand for furniture and dwellings increasing.

GRASS.—Mr. J. J. Comstock tells us that the black mud was very badly worked up in the Umpqua Valley, by the late rains, and that the young grass is growing finely. The hills begin to look green.

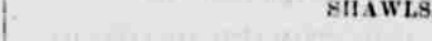
