

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES—SPECIAL SESSION.—The Board met at the usual hour—all the members present. Mr. Linn, President, called the meeting to order, and stated the object of the meeting, when the minutes of the last meeting were read, amended, and approved. The following bills were reported back to the Board and ordered paid: M. Bellinger's bill for wood, \$5; Love & Bilger's bill, \$4; SENTINEL'S bill, \$4; O. Coyle's bill, \$2; Fisher & Bro., \$15. Bills presented against the town: SENTINEL'S bill for publishing Ordinance No. 23, \$20; Love & Bilger's bill for nails, \$3 50; Thos. Curry's bill for removing dead animal, \$5 50. The bills were laid over under the rates. A petition was received from Wm. Hoffman, J. R. Neil and others, praying the Board to have a foot-bridge made across the waters of Jackson creek on Oregon street; after the reading of the same, Mr. Martin moved that the prayer of the petitioners be granted, and an order was passed authorizing and directing the Street Commissioner to build the bridge, and to use the two sections of the old bridge for that purpose. A petition, numerously signed, was presented to the Board by Jas. R. Neil, Esq., and read, praying the Board to cause the removal to the Town Cemetery, of the persons whose remains still lie in the old Jacksonville burying ground; on motion, the petition was laid over for further consideration. It was ordered that public notice be given, requesting the friends and relatives of those persons whose remains yet lie in the old burying ground, to remove the same from thence to the Town Cemetery without further notice. The Town Attorney informed the Board that he had been requested to draw an ordinance to prevent the obstructions of streets and sidewalks in town, and in accordance therewith he presented the manuscript of the same; also, one declaring all the streets in town public highways. They were read, and, on motion, laid over to the next meeting. A warrant was ordered drawn for W. G. T'Vault's third quarterly salary of \$25 coin. Adjourned.

ROW AT WILLOW SPRINGS.—On Monday last a difficulty occurred at Willow Springs between a party of white men and Chinamen, in which one of the white men was hit in the back with a stone and on the leg with a shovel. One of the Chinamen had an arm broken, and two others injured with rocks. It seems the Chinamen purchased of some miners this Summer a claim, which was measured off to them, but incorrectly, as it seems; for a part of the claim conflicted with that of a company of white men. The Chinamen commenced work on this disputed tract, when they were ordered to desist, but not complying, the white men jumped into the claim and proceeded to tear away the sluice-boxes. The celestials, probably thinking their right to work there good, and the privilege of defending their premises proper, showed fight to the intruders; and one of the men receiving a stroke on the leg from a shovel, the whites retreated to the bank and made free use of the stones lying thereabouts. The battle resulted as above stated. We understand the difference has been settled by the men who sold the claim to the Chinamen—purchasing the disputed strip—thus making the Chinamen's title good.

SPELLING SCHOOL.—We understand that the citizens of Williamsburg, in Josephine county, have established an old fashioned spelling school, and that everybody is taking a part in the exercises. Miners leave their ground sluice, farmers their plow and the trader his store, and all meet to spell. Our devil says it would be a fine idea to get up a spelling school in Jacksonville, and his Satanic Majesty desires us to call the attention of the folks to the subject.

SNOW.—We understand that all the forepart of the week, snow fell in quantities about Kerbyville and on lower Rogue river. About Grave creek the ground is white with the wintry mantle. About town and in the valley we have had no snow yet; but the low hills at the head of Jackson creek are covered, and as a consequence, the weather is quite cool.
