

BREAKWATERS.—The late raise of Jackson creek causes uneasiness to property holders within reach of the mud freaks of the stream. The subject of breakwaters is being very generally canvassed through town; some advocating a special tax for that purpose, while others think the thing should be done by subscription. It is estimated that it will require from \$1,000 to \$1,500 to complete the system already commenced. If this amount cannot be raised by subscription, we are of opinion that taxation should be resorted to rather than the work should go undone. It has been ascertained by a tedious course of experiment, that a system of breakwaters can be built which will be a certain protection to the town; and we think that it is folly for the town to fail to perform a piece of work because it requires the outlay of a few dollars. This protection from the ravages of the water has become one of magnitude, so much so, that the property holders are not equal to the task of controlling it.
